Lorraine Byrne is a member of the school's


the nursing home to know there's somebody else in the community thinking of them, especially during lockdown.

When asked what Dylan would think about a memorial match being held for him, Noel said: "Dylan would love the attention, he was very popular. "He would love the fact that there was

The victim was lucky to survive when a gunman fired multiple shots at the car was sitting in outside a house on Ballyfermot Crescent, around 7.30pm on Wednesday, November 17

on Friday, December 17. He was taken to Clondalkin Garda Station and detained under

THREE large boxes of football club gear made its way from Tallaght to Uganda from Kilnamanagh Football Club for those living in a disadvantaged area to wear while playing football matches.

Masterplan process starts for €5.6m Corkagh plans

Council have lodged plans for 'hub zone' which will include new cafe

THE PUBLIC consultation process has opened for the 'masterplan' to enhance the visitor experience at Corkagh Park, which includes a new café and

enhancement of the fairy woodland trail. It was reported that when the initial masterplan was proposed in 2019, South Dublin County Council estimated that the works will cost in the region of €.6million.

Plans were first presented to the council two-years-ago and since then BDP Design Consultants have been appointed to progress the development to Part 8 stage.

The Part 8 planning process has begun with statutory public consultation and the final decision will be made in early 2022. Now, the local planning authority has

lodged a planning application seeking to construct a new 'hub zone' which will include a new cafe. This 'hub zone' will include 10 public

toilets, kitchen, storage, a serving area and internal seating with it having the multi-use events space with a stage and hard standing area.

There is also provision for softlandscaping with formal seating areas, picnic areas, an amenity lawn, mounds,



incidental play area and planting at this 'hub zone' Enhancements of the fairy woodland

trail are also in the plans.

This aspect of the proposals include new play features, seating, pedestrian link from the lakes, additional native ornamental shrubs and grasses and the protection of existing mature trees. Proposals include the provision of

wayfinding and signage installations, as

well as the enhancement of the primary and secondary routes around the Clondalkin park.

St John's Wood Car Park is set to be resurfaced and reorganised with the Green Isle Car Park entrance to be relocated and widened and a new link path from Outer Ring Road car park will be developed.

All the aforementioned car parks will include "future proofing for EV charging

points" and an "11m high arrival beacon"

should the plans get the green-light. A new pedestrian link entrance between both the Kilcarbery Grange development and Camac Valley Camping Park to Corkagh Park are among the plans.

With the planning application filed on December 20, submissions and observations are being encouraged to be submitted through consult.sdublincoco.ie by February 9, 2022.



FOLLOWING long queues of traffic on the Main Road in Tallaght, South Dublin County Council have confirmed that they will examine the location and bring a report to the next Traffic Management Meeting.

Tallaght councillor Mick Duff tabled the question at a recent council meeting regarding the heavy traffic, which he says is particularly bad in the afternoon and evening on the Main Road heading in the direction of the new Greenhills Road Intersection.

Cllr Duff asked for a review to be carried out to determine if an alternative traffic management system could be devised which would separate traffic heading straight onto the Village or turning left towards the N81 from the traffic seeking to turn right onto the Greenhills Road.





No discussions to remove DFB as provider of ambulance service

ONE local TD has welcomed the comments of the Dublin Fire Brigade Chief Fire Officer Dennis Keeley that there are no discussions underway to remove Dublin Fire Brigade as a provider of ambulance services for Dublin city. Sinn Féin TD for Dublin South West Seán Crowe

said that he is "glad to hear" that there are no discussions underway, after it has been feared for some years now that plans were in motion to do so. Teachta Crowe commented: "It has been a

growing concern for some time that Dublin Fire Brigade would no longer provide ambulance cover in Dublin and would be replaced by the National Ambulance Service.

"I believe the joint medical model of fire and medical emergency response is one that works well in Dublin and should be held up as an example to how emergency response should look state-wide.'

As reported in last week's Echo, Teachta Crowe criticised the Government for lack of action on staff shortages in Dublin Fire Brigade, which he claimed were "directly impacting" the firefighters on their response time and capacity to respond to major incidents, ultimately putting them at a greater risk.

Following this, he stated that additional support from Government to get more people trained up and graduated into Dublin Fire Brigade is necessary.

New primary school plans are shelved councillors furious

PLANS for the construction of a new primary school as part of the Kilcarbery development were shelved as "the requirement to establish it has not yet materialised", according to the Department of Education.

As reported in The Echo last week, Clondalkin councillors Francis Timmons (Ind) and William Carey (SF) voiced their anger at the Department's decision not to proceed with the school development.

Cllr Timmons said that residents were "not going to be happy" about it, while Cllr Carey said he would be writing to the Minister of Education, Norma Foley TD,

to seek an explanation for the decision. A spokesperson for the Department of Education told *The Echo*: "The Department is aware of the need to make educational provision for the future residents of Kilcarbery.

"In this regard, a new primary school was announced in 2018 for the Clondalkin area as a result principally of the Kilcarbery development.

"Originally, it had been planned that this school would open in 2021, but that opening has been deferred as the requirement to establish it has not yet materialised.

"The Department confirmed in its submission to the South County Dublin Draft Development Plan 2022-2028 that it is planned to locate this school on a Department-owned site at Deansrath Community College, which is very close to the Kilcarbery

development. "A decision on the timing of the establishment of the school will be made based on demographic requirements as the residential development progresses. "The matter will be kept under continuing review."

Kilcarbery is a joint venture development of 1,034 homes on 29 acres of council lands, being carried out by Adwood Ltd, a consortium of established Dublin builders Adroit and Maplewood, and South Dublin County Council.

Adwood will pay the council €38m and deliver 310 social housing units at competitive rates over four vears, according to the council.

The development was approved by South Dublin County councillors in December 2019.

A PROTEST took place outside the Commission for Regulation of Utilities in Tallaght calling for a cap on energy prices last weekend.

A DUBLIN man who told gardai he was forced to hold a large quantity of drugs to pay off a drug bill has been given a three-and-a-half-year suspended sentence, *reports Claire Henry*. Jonathan Kearns (24), of Russell Crescent,

Tallaght, pleaded guilty at Dublin Circuit Criminal Court to possession of cannabis for sale or supply at his home on March 13, 2020.

Detective Garda David Jennings told Michael Hourigan BL, prosecuting, that on March 13, 2020, he obtained a search warrant for Russell Crescent.

He said when gardai went to the house to execute the warrant the partner of the defendant let them in. During the search gardai found cannabis in a Tesco shopping bag in the hotpress of the home. A weighing scales was also

The garda said when the drugs were shown to the partner of the accused she was shocked. The accused was not present in the home at the time of the search but two months later he presented himself to Tallaght garda station.

He was arrested and he told gardai that the drugs found were his, but said he was forced to hold them to pay off his drug debt. The court heard that a total of 437 grams of cannabis with a value of C,754 were found at the house and Kearns was shocked to hear of the high value of

the drugs. The court heard that he has not come to the attention of the gardai since his arrest and that he is also the father of two young children, one of which has a serious illness

deal with throughout the process. She said her client had a difficult childhood with both parents being addicted to heroin and told the court that his mother gave him methadone as a baby.

The court heard that the accused had been involved with child services since he was born and has lived in many care homes and foster homes.

He was cared for by his aunt for many years, and when he was 16 years of age, she passed away. It was at this time that Kearns began to misuse cocaine, counsel said. Kearns has now been drug-free for several years and undergoes regular urine analysis.

He is a very talented footballer and trains

Judge Pauline Codd outlined that the value of the drugs was in the mid to upper range of the offence with a headline sentence of four years.

Judge Codd considered the mitigating factors such as the accused's addictions, his difficult background, and that he was addressing his addiction with evidence of clear urine analysis reports. She imposed a three-and-a-half-year sentence

which she suspended in full for three years on condition that Kearns remains under the supervision of the probation services for two years and remains drug-free while providing urine analysis if directed by the probation

'Copycat offences' against two women three years apart

Man (35) jailed for over 17 years for falsely imprisoning and sexually abusing women

A MAN who carried out "copycat offences" three years apart against two women whom he falsely imprisoned and sexually abused has been jailed for 17-and-a-half years.

Ioan Lingurar (35) raped the first victim after she woke up in his car. The woman tried to get out, but the car was locked and she only managed to escape some time after the attack

The Central Criminal Court heard that three years later, Lingurar sexually assaulted another woman in a car. This woman managed to escape after grabbing the wheel and punching him. The court heard that Lingurar was arrested after

DNA taken after both incidents was matched with a pre-existing DNA profile in Austria that identified him as the attacker.

Following a trial in October 2021, Lingurar was convicted by a jury of rape and false imprisonment of a woman at or near Old Bawn Road, Tallaght, Dublin, on February 14, 2016. He had denied the charges.

Linguarar, with an address at Clarinda Park East, Dun Laoghaire, Co Dublin, pleaded guilty to the sexual assault and false imprisonment of a second woman at locations within Co Dublin on February 24, 2019.

He has five previous convictions, including a conviction for sexual assault in France in 2011. He also has convictions in Ireland for attempted theft and road traffic offences.

Passing sentence on Monday, Ms Justice Tara Burns said these were "chilling and unsettling cases" in which "copycat offences" were committed against two women of similar age and appearance, after he picked them up in a similar area at a similar time of year.

Justice Burns said the fact that neither victim can remember several hours of the night of the offences is "particularly troubling". She said while both had consumed alcohol, this was not given as an explanation. The judge said the offences were aggravated by

the serious nature of the offending, the



circumstances of both victims being locked in a car with their phones taken from them and the length of time they were both detained. She said the offences were further aggravated by

the women being "preyed on" when they were by themselves late at night and Lingurar having a previous conviction for sexual assault.

Justice Burns said in light of the fact that the offences were committed three years apart against two different women, consecutive sentences were appropriate.

Justice Burns sentenced Lingurar to ten years imprisonment and seven-a-and-half years imprisonment respectively for the offences in 2016 and 2019. She ordered that these sentences run consecutively for an effective operative sentence

of 17-and-a-half-years imprisonment.

The judge commented that as both victims are completely unrelated to Lingurar, his identification will have no consequences for their anonymity.

In her victim impact statement, which was read out in court, the victim of the offences in 2016 said that while the physical injuries did not have a longstanding effect, the psychological effects "will last a lifetime"

The woman said it was impossible to put into words "the pain and heartache" of having your "freedom and dignity stripped away". She said after the offences she was scared of strangers and terrified to come into contact with family and friends

She said she felt as though she was "ostracised"

by her rapist's actions. She said she wanted to make sure any other woman who would have been affected by him is not.

In her victim-impact statement, which she read out in court, the victim of the offences in 2019 said that on the outside it might seem like she is coping, but that is "a front" and she is masking how she feels.

The woman said she is "still living this nightmare" that she cannot wake up from. She said it was something she thinks she will never forget and she just has to live with that.

She said it does not matter how many showers she has, she still feels dirty. She said she will keep going and "never let him win" because her child needs her.

Salvation Army: 'respect, structure and security' Charity bridges gaps in people's lives and helps them move forward

BATTLING depression, alcohol abuse and homelessness for 20 years, Eddie Brennan is one of many people who have been saved by the Salvation Army.

Originally from Ballyfermot, Eddie (54) now calls the York House Lifehouse in Longford Street his home – along with 80 other men recovering from mental health issues or addiction.

"I have my own key, my own place, a desk and shelves. I have privacy when I need it, but I also know that someone is keeping an eye out for me. As I see it, we're all brothers and sisters in here," said Eddie.

"Respect and structure and security – if you have those things, you can move forward with your life.'

As a younger man, Eddie was a volunteer driver for youth clubs and senior citizens before depression took hold of his life at 30, pushing him into a spiral of homeless shelters and

psychiatric hospitals. "I was just going in circles. When you are homeless you are afraid to settle yourself. You're afraid to get to know anyone because you are always moving

on," he said. "In the hostels, there was nothing permanent. Every six months or so I'd have to pack up and move onto the next hostel so I could never really settle

Eddie now has the comfort of a safe home in the York House residential centre - one of six such centres operated by the

Salvation Army.

Army's 2020 annual report, they provided over 400 people in Dublin with safe beds every night.

A total of 133 families, along with 386 men, women and under-18s, were supported through homelessness by the organisation in the capital in 2020

Despite the challenges of the pandemic, the Christian church and charity, working with Dublin City Council, opened a new family hub in Harold's Cross

"A family hub is only

designed and suitable as shortterm accommodation for families. In their time with us, we are always helping them explore options to secure their own accommodation and make their situation as comfortable as possible," said the Salvation Army's Regional Manager, Neil McKittrick.

"That includes skills to support them for when they are back in the community." In 2020, more than 28,000 meals for adults and children

were served and hundreds of food parcels distributed by its three family hubs, which also provide cookery classes, tips on healthy eating, sport and physical activities, quiz nights and religious/spiritual support. The religious and charitable

organisation supports vulnerable people in over 100 countries worldwide.

Installation is ongoing and it hoped that these applicants will receive their locks in early 2022.

The scheme is to support older, vulnerable residents living alone by replacing their existing external door European Profile Locks with high security anti-snap locks. Due to Covid

restrictions, the council say there has been significant delays with installations.

New surgery centre cuts time for day procedures

Almost 2,000 extra day-surgery procedures went ahead

SOME 2,000 extra day surgery procedures went ahead at Tallaght University Hospital in 2021 following to the opening of its new Reeves Day Surgery Centre. Opened a year this month, the

3,460 sq m day surgery facility is located across the road from the hospital and is kitted out with four theatres, three of which are open.

Speaking with *The Echo*, the CEO of Tallaght University Hospital (TUH) Lucy Nugent said that some 2,000 day surgeries would not have gone ahead if the centre was not open.

In her interview that looked back at 2021, Ms Nugent noted a number of positives among the challenges faced in

the past 12 months. "We had the cyber-attack and a power outage, but there have been some positives," Ms Nugent said. "TUH entered into a new energy-

efficiency contract to reduce our carbon

footprint. "We planted trees on campus and have three beehives on-site, which just produced the most amazing pure, unfiltered honey

"[The honey] is being sold in the canteen and the proceeds are going to Bugs, Bees and Native Trees.

"Five Sláinte Care projects piloted in the community have received permanent funding and TUH was also designated as one of two [dedicated] Women's Health

units in the country [in 2021]." Ms Nugent also confirmed that 2,000 extra day surgeries were carried out in 2021 due to the opening of the new Reeves centre, a community-based surgical day-procedure facility, with 24 recovery beds

"We are on target to have no patient waiting longer than three months for any day surgery procedure by June 2022," Ms Nugent said

Covid-related activity and critical care. "We are in the middle of a fourth wave. "We have a tried and tested plan in place but that's not to say it doesn't put us

under pressure – staff are exhausted. "We're trying to manage non-Covid activity as well While acknowledging some of the projects progressed in 2021, Ms Nugent

recognised the difficult year it has been for many of its patients and their families, hospital staff and the wider community

"I do acknowledge that both our staff and community have made huge personal sacrifices this year and endured personal loss," Ms Nugent said.

Among the challenges faced is rising Emergency Department (ED) attendances, which are currently at a six-year high.

The former Children's Hospital A&E, which is vacant after re-locating to the new paediatric urgent care centre, will be reconfigured as part of the adult's acute floor

This will give TUH additional space to assist with streamlining as people enter ED, helping patients to access senior decision-makers quicker.

The TUH Foundation has also funded a new CT scanner for the ED floor which has AI software that, for example, guides a radiologist and stroke doctor to the part of a brain where there has been a bleed.

The AI software helps the team to identify the bleed quicker. While speaking with *The Echo*, close to 40 patients with Covid were being cared for by the team at Tallaght, with rising cases this Christmas due to the Omicron

variant a concern for staff. Speaking to the community, Ms Nugent said: "Continue doing what you are doing.

"Observe social distancing, get a booster if you can and if sick, stay home and get tested as early as possible.

"The community really has been a valuable support to the hospital, and we apologise if there are delays, we're trying to manage things as fast as we can.

Concerns with over 50 data centres in county

23 data centres already exist in Grange Castle and Profile Park

SHIVERS were sent down spines when Minister Eamon Ryan warned the Irish public to be prepared for "tight" electricity supplies for the next three to four years.

The Green Party leader said data centres, which use enormous amounts of power, would not be exempt from national requirements to conserve energy, but the pressure on our national grid is a major concern.

Ireland has approximately 70 data centres, with over 90 per cent located in the greater Dublin region.

Closer to home, if you include existing data centres and plans for new data centres - South Dublin County could have over 50 such facilities in the next few years.

According to Bitpower Energy Solutions report in May 2021, South Dublin County has 34 operational data centres, the majority of which (23) are located in Grange Castle and Profile Park

A further 11 are operational within Citywest/Parkwest/Tallaght.

The report listed another three under construction, 12 approved for planning, and another four were in the planning stage. The latest weekly planning lists for the county

show Equinix are seeking permission for a fifth data centre in Dublin – and a third in Profile Park – this one a massive part four storey facility.

Huge companies like Apple, Google, Microsoft, Facebook, and Amazon, have invested in substantial data centre infrastructure in Dublin.

Amazon's data centre at the former Jacobs site on Belgard Road is expected to provide much of the heat in the roll out of Tallaght's pilot District Heating Scheme next year, but the general public remain skeptical as to the impact data centres will have on our national energy capacity. TD Gino Kenny (PBP) has said the expansion

of data centres would "further lock Ireland into reliance on fossil fuels for other sectors because of the amount of renewable energy capacity that the data centres demand." Along with the risk of missing climate targets,

Kenny warned the additional burden on the energy system is "completely unsustainable" and presents "massive problems in

people and businesses

This week, Eirgrid, the national grid operator, shocked the data centre industry after it told them it will not be able to provide them with new connection agreements

for facilities in the region until 2028 at the earliest.

The move will not apply to planned centres that have yet to be developed but already have connection agreements.

News of the move arrived despite a recent policy paper from the Commission for Regulation of Utilities (CRU) recommended that data centres which build their own power supply on-site could be awarded a grid connection.

According to SDCC, the majority of data centres in the county are located in clusters on 'EE' (Employment and Enterprise) zoned lands in Grange Castle and Citywest, with two located on 'REGEN' (Regeneration) zoned lands in the Tallaght / Greenhills area.

The council said data centres in the county have an average floor area of 20,000 sq. m and an average site area of approximately 11 hectare

An SDCC Planning Department study on data centres in 2019, said there "appears" to be approximately 100 people employed "ongoing,

during the operational stage, per 20,000 sq. m." "While levels of employment are significantly lower than other uses such as office, R&D hubs etc, data centres generate a significantly higher level of revenue in terms of rates."

A recent report by BloombergNEF said Irish data centres will account for about 15 per cent of the country's total electricity consumption in 2021

Driven by growth, the challenge will be to balance the above with an already tight capacity on the electricity grid.

Community Centre lodges appeal against football club development

Concerns arose when car-parking spaces appeared to be located in centre's grounds

THE Kilnamanagh Family Recreation Centre is seeking permission to appeal South Dublin County Council's decision to grant permission to Kilnamanagh AFC for a new clubhouse on Treepark Road.

The centre management wants to specifically appeal the car-parking aspect of the permitted development, as the proposed car park for the clubhouse falls into the grounds of the community centre's lands.

An Bord Pleanála received the community centre's application for leave to appeal this month, which was lodged by the chairman of the Kilnamanagh Family Recreation Centre, Martin O'Brien.

Mr O'Brien stated that the leave to appeal centred only on "a single aspect of the development, i.e. the 67 car-parking spaces the applicant was subsequently requested to provide".

The 67 car-parking spaces were not in the football club's initial application for planning permission, but were added to the application at a later stage via additional information that was requested by the council.

The car-parking spaces "are not within the land of the proposed development but are located in our community centre grounds," according to Mr O'Brien. "These 67 car parking spaces are already part of the 99 car parking spaces that we ourselves had to submit to the planning authority when we were seeking approval for an extension to our building.

"This gives rise to serious liability insurance concerns as it would now seem that there would be a conflict of responsibilities between us and the Kilnamanagh AFC."

However, Mr O'Brien added that the community centre is "extremely open" to working with the football club to come up with "a viable alternative" for the location of the car-parking spaces.

He suggested the development of a grassed area that is not currently in use as a potential location for the parking spaces.

A decision on the community centre's application for leave to appeal is due from An Bord Pleanála by January 14.

The state-of-the-art clubhouse on Treepark Road is to be developed at a cost of approximately €500,000, which the club has fundraised for over recent months.

The proposed facilities in the clubhouse include dressing rooms, toilets, a referee room, a club shop, a treatment room and an external strength and conditioning area. South Dublin County Council

granted planning permission for the clubhouse on November 11.

Doubts arise of feasability of SDCC housing targets

COUNCILLORS have expressed doubts over South Dublin County Council's housing targets in their Housing Delivery Action Plan 2022-2026.

The plan was discussed at Monday's monthly meeting of South Dublin County Council, where the local authority outlined targets for the delivery of 3,707 housing units from 2022 to 2026.

Of these units, 1,869 are to be located on council land, 852 are to be maintained by Approved Housing Bodies (AHBs), and 696 are to come on stream as a result of the Part V planning legislation that requires a percentage of large residential developments to contain social housing.

The remaining 290 units are to be provided by leasing, according to the council.

The majority of the projected units are to be located in the Clondalkin LEA, totalling 1,224, followed by Lucan with 740, Palmerstown-Fonthill with 535, Tallaght South with 485, Tallaght Central with 316, and Firhouse-Bohernabreena with 219, with the lowest amount, totalling 188, in Rathfarnham-Templeogue. A priority-needs analysis in the plan found that 49.5 per cent of people on the priority-needs housing list required onebed housing, while 33.2 per cent required two-bed units, 15.2 per cent required three-bed housing, and 2.1 per cent required fourbed properties.

When discussing the priority-needs analysis at the meeting of South Dublin County Council on Monday afternoon, a number of councillors expressed reservations about the local authority's ability to address the priority housing needs.

Fine Gael councillor David McManus said: "If the priorityneeds analysis shows 49.5 per cent one-beds, does that mean we'll see that reflected in what we're building and what AHBs are building?"

Social Democrats councillor Carly Bailey said: "In terms of one-bed and four-bed needs and priority needs, it's not a significant number by any stretch, but we seem to be falling substantially behind."

Sinn Féin councillor Cathal King said he welcomed the plan, but highlighted the increasing need for one-bed housing units in the county.

"One-beds are a huge issue, and we're in need of one-beds," he said. "In this four-year plan, are 50 per cent of the [planned] units going to be one-beds?"

In response to the councillors, the council's director of housing, Colm Ward, said that the units in the plan are "separate from what might come on-stream in private developments" and he added that the council is open to discussions with AHBs and local communities.

Repairs to leisure centre swimming pool boom to take place in January

REPAIRS to the boom in the swimming pool in Clondalkin Leisure Centre are due to take place in January 2022. The boom has been broken since August this year.

In response to Clondalkin councillor Eoin Ó Broin's question about the repairs at a recent council meeting, South Dublin County Council has confirmed that repairs to fix the boom in Clondalkin Leisure Centre are

booked for the week of January 24, 2022. The council added that a specialist maintenance team will arrive with the parts required, however, it must be noted that this maintenance plan is based on travel restrictions remaining open between the UK and Ireland.

As previously reported by The Echo at the beginning of August this year, the boom at the leisure centre was broken and was estimated to take ten weeks to repair, much to the frustration of visitors of the centre.

Despite the repairs needed, Clondalkin Leisure Centre and the swimming pool have



remained open throughout. Since opening in 2008, Clondalkin Leisure Centre has experienced a range of different technical difficulties, and in 2019 it was reported that €238,000 has been spent on repairs to the Centre since its opening, including €10,000 on swimming pool

repairs. In 2020, oil leaked into the pool tank, requiring replacement of four small hoses containing hydraulic fluid. Getting the four hoses replaced turned out to be a complex

issue, as a specialist contractor was required to travel over from the UK to carry out the work but was unable to do so until a later date because of the pandemic.

Similarly, there have been issues with the boom in the pool at Tallaght Leisure Centre, which is estimated to cost more than €500,000 to fix, as recently reported by *The* Echo.

For years, the boom has been stuck in a permanently upright position, and has prevented 25m-length swims at the centre.

Mast 'falls within direct line of sight' from front windows of resident

A TYMON North resident has lodged an appeal against South Dublin County Council's decision to grant permission for a 15-metre-high telecommunications mast and associated cabinet at the edge of an open space in the area, reports Aideen O'Flaherty.

The structures were installed in Tymon North Park by Cignal Infrastructure Ltd last February, after they had received planning permission from the council the previous September.

However, residents voiced concerns when the structures were installed and criticised the planning process used for the installation of masts

Applicants no longer need to apply for planning permission to erect overground electronic communications infrastructure, which are exempted developments that can be carried out under licence.

This amendment to legislation has resulted in members of the community and elected representatives being unaware of the installation of masts in their areas.

This month, Tymon North Park resident Audrey Clarke submitted an appeal to An Bord Pleanála against the council's decision to grant permission for the structures.

In the appeal, lodged by Armstrong Planning on behalf of Ms Clarke, the appellant states that the "tower and associated operator cabinet will fall within

the direct line of sight from Ms Clarke's front windows". In their grounds for appeal, the appellant said that Cignal's rationale for the location of the structures "relies heavily on unevidenced technical reasons" and "fails to provide sufficient planning justification".

Instead, the appellant suggested that the Greenhills Business Park or the local retail centre would be "far more locationally preferable" places for the structures, while the "undue proliferation of street objects" at the Tymon North Park location combined with the structures "results in an overbearing impact". A decision on the appeal is due on April 13.

Council questioned over alleged 'hand-holding of housing bodies'

A COUNCILLOR has questioned how much "hand-holding" South Dublin County Council is providing to Approved Housing Bodies (AHB) by supplying them with council land for housing developments, *reports*

with council land for housing developments, *reports* Aideen O'Flaherty. Independent Clondalkin councillor Eoin Ó Broin made the remark as part of a wider discussion about the council's Housing Action Plan 2022-2026 at Monday's monthly council meeting. The Housing Action Plan details social and affordable housing delivery in the county, and also outlines locations and the number of units for housing to be built

to be built.

According to the plan, the council expects the delivery of 3,707 housing units by 2026, 1,869 of which are to be on council-owned land with 852 units being provided by AHBs.

Speaking at the council meeting, Cllr Ó Broin asked whether AHBs will get "their own land" for their housing developments "and do it themselves that way".

He added: "How much are we holding their hands by giving them the [council] lands?" In an interview after the meeting, Cllr Ó Broin said he felt that there needs to be "less AHBs and more council" managed developments, as it's his view that there's a duplication in the work done by the AHBs and

the council, in terms of the management and maintenance of developments. "You've got so many teams doing the same thing, when in my opinion if there was one council team doing it, it would be more efficient," he added.

spokesperson for South Dublin County Council was contacted for comment, but a response wasn't received at the time of going to print.



Speaking to *The Echo* about winning the award, Jessica said: "I was delighted when I found out that I had won.

Robert first shared his experience of living with DLD, which affects speech and language comprehension, in October 2020 and has continued to raise awareness of the condition locally and

when asked if he ever felt any trepidation about sharing his experiences, Robert said: "It didn't

make me nervous. I did it because someone had to raise awareness of DLD. "I didn't expect such a big

response, because it's not a very well-known disorder, but the last two years have been mad."

Robert's proud mother Brenda Mockler, who is *The Echo's* deputy editor, added: "Robert put himself out there, and obviously it's not easy for a kid to do that, so it's great for him to get this recognition at a local level."

For Katherine McKenna, who runs the Rays of Sunshine Playschool in Firhouse which caters to children with autism, winning in the special needs and carers category had a particular resonance for her as she was nominated by Sinead Tighe.

Sinead Tighe. Sinead's son, Daniel, has a rare condition called Sotos Syndrome and the mother-of-two has worked hard to make Tallaght an inclusive place for people of all abilities. She is also TCC's inclusion officer. Katherine told *The Echo*: "I was

bawling crying when I found out I'd won, and especially because Sinead nominated me, and she does amazing work in Tallaght to make sure the community is very inclusive for everyone with special needs. So, to get the nomination from her meant a lot to me."

A total of 12 children with autism attend the Rays of Sunshine Playschool, which has seven staff members, and Katherine set it up to provide a tailored learning experience for the children. "I trained as a primary school

"I trained as a primary school teacher, but I wanted to help children who'd slipped through the net or couldn't do mainstream education," Katherine, who is from Aylesbury, explained.

"We look at the individual needs of the children, there shouldn't be a 'one size fits all' system in education."

In Jobstown, runner Stephen Martin's running club has been going from strength to strength – and this hasn't gone unnoticed by TCC, who named him this year's winner in the sports category. Stephen was nominated by Evelyn

Stephen was nominated by Evelyn Riordan from TCC, who said Stephen had set up "a communityled, free running club, who use local parks as their running tracks.

"Open to all ages and abilities, they meet three to four times a week, helping members to develop a love of walking and running, as well as creating a strong sense of ownership in their local parks."

A total of nine local people won awards in this year's Tallaght Person of the Year Awards, with their achievements being covered in *The Echo* over the past four weeks.

A FUNDRAISER established two years ago by a grieving sister has raised €33,000 for Our Lady's Hospice.

"This has brought huge comfort to people and turned a really sad and difficult time of the year into a happy event.

Serena said she was "overwhelmed by support" and thanked "all family, friends and local businesses", for their help in ensuring the event was a resounding success.

"We raised an amazing amount €12,400 this year, and there are still funds being added," said Serena. "There was also €2,000 from a Santa's grotto event.

'Regrettable' Cycle Scheme delays

THE Grange Road Cycle Scheme is set to be completed in April 2022 following delays due to a significant amount of "existing and historical services" which have impacted the contractor's progress. South Dublin County Council confirmed the expected

South Dublin County Council confirmed the expected completion date of the scheme at a recent council meeting when councillor Lynn McCrave tabled the question following the long delay.

The scheme was initially approved by councillors in 2015, but progress on the project was slowed due to funding constraints. It was then recommenced in 2019, and a contractor was appointed in late 2020 and was halted due to Covid-19 restrictions.

The council said that it is "regrettable" that significant delays have been encountered, but confirmed that the contractor, Wills Bros Ltd., has carried out works "expeditiously" as possible while ensuring the safety of the site.

They added: "The council appreciates your patience in this matter, and we look forward to a completed project which will improve the safety of all road users."

which will improve the safety of all road users." The scheme, when complete, will consist of 675m of re-configurated road, inclusive of on- and off-road cycle-tracks, new pavement works, new footways, modern public lighting, relocated bus stops, landscaping and shared accesses.

Within the scheme, there will be dedicated school zones and junction improvements at Nutgrove Avenue, Loreto Terrace, Convent Lane, Dispensary Lane, Stonepark Abbey and St. Enda's Drive.


The foundation was set up by Ciarán's parents, Gemma and Philip Carr, with the aim of educating people about CPR and the use of defibrillators, and also installing

Key dates revealed for completion of Kiltipper Park Phase Two works

PHASE TWO of the works at Kiltipper Park is currently underway, with a projected completion date of the end of 2022, reports Aimee Walsh.

South Dublin County Council outlined the plans and revealed key dates of the works in a presentation to local representatives at a

recent council meeting. In May 2020, South Dublin County Council submitted a Part 8 Planning Application for proposed works at Kiltipper Park. The proposed development of the park

include construction of 30 additional parking spaces, a GAA pitch with vertical ball-stop netting, two soccer pitches, a children's playground area, integrated landscape features including a woodland area, and a new shared surface entrance and pathway

The proposals for the park are being delivered on a phased basis, and the tender for the construction of Phase Two is currently underway. This phase includes completion of

access points, footpaths, hedgerow improvements and viewing areas. Approval for the Part 8 planning application for the proposed works at Kiltipper Park was granted at a council meeting in July 2020, however amendments and a reorientation of the soccer and GAA pitches were required due to concerns surrounding the distance from the pitches to the houses on

Ellensborough Grange. Construction is expected to commence on site in the second quarter of 2022, with the completion of works due at the end of the vear.

Calls to reverse parking charges decision

THERE are calls to reverse the decision to apply "unnecessary" parking charges on Saturdays at a metered car park on Old Bawn Road. Local councillor Charlie O'Connor, along with other members of the Tallaght Area Committee, requested the reversal of the decision at a recent council meeting, stating that it is a

"blow to the traders". The parking charges, which are at the metered car park on Oldbawn Road at its junction with Mountain Park, are at a cost of €1 per hour Monday to Saturday. The charges were

implemented by South Dublin County Council under their new Bye Laws contract in May this year, after a public consultation period. In their response to the request, the council stated that one location or element of the Bye Laws cannot be changed in isolation, and any proposed changes would require a full review of the Bye Law's in its entirety.

Kebab skewer lodged in puppy's stomach

Eight-month-old puppy saved by emergency surgery

IT WAS a lucky escape for an eight-month-old puppy who had to be saved by emergency surgery after a kebab skewer became wedged in her stomach and penetrated her liver.

Luna, a young Belgian shepherd puppy, was rushed to My Vet in Firhouse after her owner Aoife Kelly found a raw swelling on her stomach which turned out to be a sharp kebab skewer penetrating through her abdomen and was piercing her liver. Luna had began vomiting two days prior

to Aoife discovering the swelling, which had initially alarmed her. When Luna was brought into the vet in Firhouse, the swelling was quickly investigated and an ultrasound scan confirmed the horrific injury.

Speaking about the discovery, vet Sarah Martin, who took charge of the case with vet nurse Sarah O'Malley, said: "Luna's owner said she may have sneakily eaten a chicken kebab on a stick a few days before.

"She'd been vomiting for a couple of days but then her owner noticed the swelling around the left side of her body and brought her into My Vet. performed an "We exploratory laparotomy to try to locate the skewer and

dangerous, even life-threatening, as a skewer can penetrate through any part of intestines or in some extreme cases, can enter chest cavity

the skewer, which was a complex task that required them cutting it in the centre to free up each end and pulling the pointed end through the skin externally and opening the stomach itself to remove the other end of the skewer.

According to Sarah, injuries like Luna's can often lead to infection around the abdominal organs, however fortunately for the pup, Luna's body had formed a seal around the openings preventing any major infection from spreading. "These types of incidents can be dangerous, even life-threatening, as a

skewer can penetrate through any part of intestines or in some extreme cases, can enter the chest cavity," she warned.

Much to Luna's owner Aoife's relief, little Luna has made an incredible recovery since her surgery and fully recovered just ten days later and back to "causing mischief" according to Aoife.

She said: "Luna recovered brilliantly from her surgery at My Vet, having bounced back The vets proceeded after two weeks and is now well and truly to remove back to herself."

Xquisite Dance's performance was choreographed by dance teacher and 'Dancing with the Stars Ireland' professional dancer John Nolan. "I am really delighted that Linda

invited us here tonight to be able to perform," said John. "Linda was part of Xquisite Dance with her daughter Chloe. She was with

us for a number of years. "Linda was a huge part of Xquisite Dance when she was part of it. And as you can see when she is part of anything, she does everything 100 per

cent. "She is able to rally the troops, which she has shown us tonight as well." Linda leads a team of volunteers who provide meals, food packages, toiletries

and clothing to people in need under the banner of Sharing is Caring Dublin 24. The group holds a twice-weekly food table at the walkway beside the McDonald's Drive-Thru in Tallaght, where they provide 50 to 70 meals a night, and they have also held a large Christmas dinner on Wednesday

evening. A total of €1,371 was raised for the group on the night, which will be used to provide hot meals, as well as packaged foods, toiletries and clothing for people in need.

The group receives support from many local businesses and groups in the community, including Sacred Heart FC in Killinarden which has provided them with much-needed storage space for donations.

Sharing is Caring also received a €2,000 donation from AIC Paints to keep their van running for the next two years, members of the community have donated, and Carrolls Butchers in Aylesbury added a donation of $\notin 250$ to the group's meat account.

Talking about the work of her team over the past year, Linda said: "The saddest thing, I think, what we've all noticed this year was that we didn't just have homeless people, we had people who just couldn't afford to eat anymore.

"We try to provide for anyone in need. We give takeaway dinners. And if someone cannot come to the table, we send meals for them with the lads who come by or go down and get them meals.

The event also saw the release of a single, 'It's Christmas Time', by performer and producer Kenneth O'Regan in aid of Sharing is Caring.

hours over the coming weeks and available days and times for those eligible to receive their booster jab will be published and updated on the HSE's website and the HSE Twitter page daily. Since last Sunday, walk-in boosters are now


available for the first time for everyone over 40 in vaccination centres, GPs and pharmacies. Initially the date for the over 40's cohort to receive their booster jab was December 27 but has been brought forward amid growing concerns over the Omicron

variant. The walk-in booster clinics are currently open for people aged 40 years and older, pregnant women and healthcare workers at certain vaccination centres. The booster is available for those who had their last dose more than 90 days ago. Citywest Vaccination Centre are currently

doing dose 1 and dose 2 walk-in clinics but you can register online to get an appointment on the HSE's website.

Walk-in testing for Covid-19 is not available at the moment, but you can book a free PCR test online or through your GP. There is a list of test centres available to choose from when you book online through the HSE website.

Up to date queue times for all vaccination clinics including Citywest are available on the HSE's Twitter page and will be updated regularly which people are encouraged to check it before arriving at the centre.

'We were in a pandemic before this pandemic'

Mother Sinead helps launch the Family Carer Scorecard outside the Dail

hayden@echo.ie WITH the launch of the Family Carer Scorecard, a metric for reviewing the Programme for Government's commitment to family carers, a mother described how families are "suffering".

Family Carers Ireland got together with family carers from across the country to examine the Government's progress in commitments implementing made in the Programme for Government.

This Family Carer Scorecard scored 18 commitments which are clear, measurable and have the potential to significantly improve the quality of life of family carers and those they care

for. Of those 18 commitments, five were given a score of 'regressive', seven a score of 'no progress', four received a score of 'limited progress', two received a score of 'good progress' with zero 'commitment achieved' scores. Sinead Tighe is the full-time

carer for her son Daniel, who is one of around 40 children in Ireland born with a rare genetic disorder called Sotos Syndrome.

The Tallaght woman became a key figure within the community in 2017 when their family went public with their struggles to provide a better quality of life for Daniel.

"When you look at it, the excuse used for the loss of services is Covid-19," Sinead explains. "But Covid is just the latest

excuse in a long line of excuses. "It was that there was no

funding, then it was there was nobody in place, the recruitment wasn't there, now it's Covid.

"We were in a pandemic before

this pandemic, that's the best way I could explain it.

"The services just aren't good enough, we've had no respite, theres no assessment of needs, no interventions and carers from all walks of life are seriously struggling.

"The point of the Family Carer Scorecard is to highlight that we're a year and half into this Government's lifecycle and nothing has improved, in a lot of circumstances things have regressed.

We need to keep that focus on the Government to let them know that they made these commitments but families are still suffering so bad with the inadequate services.

"The services need to be looked at, and I mean seriously looked at so that they can be fixed.'

A reduction in waiting times for assessment of needs, work to develop a pension solution for family carers that recognises their important work, increasing the income and capital disregard for Carer's Allowance and the piloting of a statutory homecare scheme were viewed as improvements with the scorecard. However, it was found through

the scorecard that there was several shortcomings in the commitments made in the Programme for Government. Among the shortcomings were

the lack of review of the National Carers' Strategy and extending the remit of the National Treatment Purchase Fund to ensure timely assessment for children and adult psychological services

Shortcomings were also found in the provision of additional residential places, respite, day



services and supports for adults with physical, sensory, and intellectual disability and autism throughout the country.

Family carers face immense challenges every day and with the Covid-19 pandemic stymying the its term in office, it is imperative Family Carers Ireland.

Government's efforts, Family Carers Ireland believe now is the time to re-up on their

commitments. "With the Government having now completed the first quarter of

that we refocus and redouble our efforts towards ensuring that the ambitions of the Programme for Government are realised," said Catherine Cox, Head of Catherine Communications and Policy,

Commuters 'disconnected' after BusConnect Phase 2 launched

The replacement of the 25 route with X30 leaves many with a sense of frustration

PHASE 2 of BusConnects, which launched at the end of November, has led to improvements but also "disconnected" many commuters in Lucan and Chapelizod.

Residents in Dodsboro/Hillcrest have lost a direct bus to the city centre and a vital bus stop at SuperValu – after the culling of the 25 route and its replacement the X30 which only operates at peak times.

TD Gino Kenny (PBP) said: "We made numerous submissions to BusConnects consultations raising the issue of the removal of the 25 bus. I was very disappointed to see the NTA going ahead with this decision. It leaves many people having to get two separate buses to get to the city centre. I'm calling on the NTA to consider increasing the services on the new X30 bus and to look at re-instating the bus stop at Supervalu." Cllr Madeleine Johansson (PBP) said the

Shackleton/Dodsboro area is "completely left out apart from the local buses".

"I have been told by South Dublin County Council that they are very keen to see buses going down the new Adamstown Boulevard, which is due to open in late January 2022."

Cllr Liona O'Toole (Ind) said these older routes 'served a purpose'' and were taken away without consultation with on-the-ground bus drivers and commuters

'During a presentation to the council back in 2016, the talk was all about enhancement, but at no stage did they talk about taking away routes."

Cllr O'Toole said Phase 2 does not include residents living in new Adamstown estates, and the overall plan still lacks a route from Lucan to

Tallaght. "It is an awful shame, and is bypassing them at the moment. They should not have launched this in November, and instead waited until after Christmas," she said Councillor Derren

Ó Brádaigh said the new feeder L51 and L52 buses are "welcome routes" but do not address the absence of a bus to service for Shackleton or Hallwell.

"There is a very palpable sense of frustration from folks that their earlier concerns were totally ignored, amongst the 72,000 submissions as part

of the public consultation," he said. "The need for the opening of Adamstown Boulevard and a suitable location for a turning circle must be urgently addressed in order to bring a bus service right into Shackleton. This is a 'here and now' issue that needs immediate thinking by South Dublin County Council, Dublin Bus and

importantly the developer in question.

Under the BusConnects C Spine plan, Chapelizod will see one bus service replacing six – meaning the loss of a direct bus connection to Lucan, Lexlip and Maynooth, according to TD Bríd Smith.

Meanwhile, the L54 bus route, which connects the Red Cow Luas Platform to Fonthill and Lucan Village, has been hailed as a positive.

Cllr Eoin Ó Broin (Ind) said: "With 90-minute ticketing if you take the L54 to the Luas or train, you do not have to pay again as it will be within the time your ticket is valid for. There will be further new routes coming next year as well.'

Report request denied on laneway network because 'council does not have sufficient resources' to gather information

A REQUEST for a comprehensive report on the laneway network in Palmerstown was denied by South Dublin County Council, on the basis that it does not have the resources, reports Maurice Garvey.

The main issues surrounding the large network of laneways in the area, concern littering, neglect, anti-social activity, and private ownership of various sections of lanes, which muddy the waters.

Cllr Guss O'Connell (Ind) submitted the request on behalf of residents at this week's local area meeting, but was appalled by the response from a local authority, who are committed to

authority, who are committed to spending over €750m on its capital programme 2022-24. "If I had a gast, it would be flabbergasted," said Cllr O'Connell. "The people living in houses backing onto the laneways, are paying property tax, and they feel neglected. To be told the council can't be bothered. L couldn't the council can't be bothered, I couldn't believe the response.

"They expect me, a part-time volunteer and others, to check it out."

O'Connell requested a report on the laneway network in Palmerstown to include which lanes are under the control of the council, which portions

are owned by third parties/privately, and the deterioration of sections deemed to be hazardous for pedestrians and

cyclists. In response, South Dublin County Council said: "The volume of work requested by this motion would require the services of a full-time referencer to gather this information. The council does not have sufficient resources available to undertake this.

"If there is a specific laneway that is of particular interest then we can endeavour to gather this information."

Cllr O'Connell, a long-serving representative, believes the "terrible" response forms part of a worrying trend for local politics. "Throughout the years, and this is no

reflection on any one individual, I have found it is getting more difficult to get things done," he said.

"We have a number of functions, the Budget and the County Development Plan, but they are not our only concerns. We represent residents, and laneways are a big issue in Palmerstown. Successive councils over the last 20/25 years have not done the work, and now it requires a concerted effort. I will be going back to

The rhythms of nature



WINTER COAT: Autumn's shortening days trigger a horse's coat to grow thicker before winter arrives

THE winter solstice on Tuesday 21st December was the shortest day of the year, with the least number of daylight hours. This day marks the turning of the year when Nature's annual cycle begins again. From now on, the hours of daylight are slowly increasing again, heading towards springtime and new growth.

The solstice marks the Celtic New Year when the natural rhythm of the change in daylength and the start of a new season is a time for celebration and hope.

These seasonal rhythms affect plants and animals. In autumn, mammals automatically respond to the shortening days by growing thicker winter fur. Other animals gain weight in preparation for hibernation.

Migratory birds instinctively fly south where days are longer and warmer. Some plants like the Christmas Cactus will only flower when daylight is less than 12 hours long – just right for our mid-winter light levels.

Humans also experience natural rhythms. Our bodies have an internal 24-hour body clock which governs our patterns of sleep and wakefulness. These 'circadian rhythms' affect our hormone levels and our core body temperature. We are most aware of them when we act against them, such as when we need to work night shifts or when we suffer jetlag after flying outside our natural time zones.

Keeping step with Nature's rhythms certainly suits our bodies and our minds better

TALLAGHT – Are you Coming out to Play? is the name of a locally made video that captures the energy and team spirit of a community always on the ball.

Produced by Tallaght Community Council (TCC), the video is the second in a series of Love Tallaght Outdoor productions, which aim to celebrate Tallaght in the absence of Tallafest.

In August, TCC released its first video, which wove 4,000 years of Tallaght's history into an epic poem, written by local historian and TCC member Albert Perris.

Growing up in Seskin View, Albert has crafted another story that this time takes us on a journey through Tallaght today, stopping off to visit residents, groups and clubs along the way.

The 10-minute video is nostalgic and relatable and will connect with anyone who has ever knocked on a friend's door on a long, warm, summer's day and asked – 'Are you coming out to play?'. All corners of Tallaght feature in the video, showcasing the many

recreational opportunities from parks to trails, pitches to ponds and historical landmarks to coffee spots.

Alongside familiar streets, waterways, fields, and hills are the people who live, work, and play here, including members of Killinarden Angling Initiative, St Mark's GAA, St Mark's Taekwondo, Bohernabreena Pitch and Putt, Tallaght RFC, Friends of Tymon Park, Tallaght FC, Thomas Davis GAA, and Friarstown Allotments.

According to Tara De Buitlear, voluntary TCC PRO, the two videos were made possible by the work of the TCC committee, videographer Fernanda Areis, support of local business and an enormous volunteer

effort across the community. The videos feature over 200 Tallaght people, showcasing "our environment and embodying much we are proud of in Tallaght," Tara said

She added: "TCC are proud of the videos and urge everyone to watch them - young and old.

"They illustrate a Tallaght not mentioned in mainstream media enough, the lesser spotted Tallaght."

WW IRELAND, formerly known as Weightwatchers Ireland, have announced that they are ceasing all workshops and other business operations on December 31, 2021 as WW International, Inc. say that they will "evaluate future potential WW offerings in Ireland". In a statement released by WW on their website,

said that there is "no timeline" as to when any WW offerings will resume in Ireland, but members are welcome to continue to engage with WW GBR Limited, which is an affiliate of WW International, to access digital tools.


The statement read: "WW International, Inc. is acquiring WW Ireland. In connection with this acquisition, WW Ireland is ceasing all Workshops (In-Person and Virtual) and other business operations (At

Home) in Ireland as of 31st December 2021. Your WW Ireland Workshop membership will end on 31st December 2021.³

The statement added that members who already have an active digital account with WW GBR, that account will automatically be extended free of charge until March 1, 2022 and will also provide all members with a free digital pass to access the web-based tools until March 1, 2023.

Mr Freyne was a well-known and muchliked vet, who built many a relationship with the community via his work at Clondalkin Animal Clinic



Will we be able to travel without risk at Christmas?

GIVEN The limited window for Christmas travel to see family, it raises the prospect of gridlocked roads and packed Luas trams, risking further spreading of the virus. Planned railway upgrade works over the period could compound any problems.

Although it will not be a normal Christmas, people need to make a careful judgment about visiting elderly relatives, because this virus is obviously not going to grant a Christmas truce. Omicron virus doesn't know it's Christmas.

Dublin Airport Authority (DAA), which runs Dublin Airport, expects 850,000 travellers over the 12 days of Christmas. That's up 235,000 passengers who travelled last year, when air traffic was curtailed by Covid-19, but down 42 per cent on 2019, when 1.5m came and returned.

Between now and Tuesday, January 4, 45,000 people will use the airport daily with the busiest two 24-hour periods on Sunday, December 19, and Thursday, December 23.

To cope with potential festive surge, passengers are obliged to complete a passenger locator form online before touching down in Ireland.

Does the negative result have to be from a PCR test? What about antigen tests? If passengers are not vaccinated they must furnish a negative PCR result. They must also furnish a negative PCR result if they are travelling from any "scheduled state" – currently seven African countries – regardless of their vaccination status. The clock starts ticking the moment they

undergo the test and halts the moment they arrive, not the moment they are scheduled to arrive or the moment they are scheduled to leave their country of departure.



head of his round-the-world trip on Christmas Eve, Santa Claus took some time out from his busy schedule for his annual interview with *The Echo*.

Speaking to *The Echo* from his bustling workshop in Lapland, Santa sounded jolly and relaxed as he polished his boots in preparation for his overnight global present drop.

In this exclusive interview, Santa said he is really looking forward to visiting all of the children living in South Dublin County who have been very good this year.

He also reminisced about a time when his reindeers went to visit all of their deer friends who live in the Dublin Mountains.

The Big Man in Red also revealed that he is pleased that the Tanáiste, Leo Varadkar, has confirmed that he is exempt from all travel restrictions as he is fully vaccinated, and that the Department of Trade, Enterprise and Tourism "will leave no stone unturned" to ensure he can carry out his essential work.

While Santa's workshop was very noisy, with elves singing Christmas carols as they worked very hard to finish their toys, *The Echo* had a charming chat with Santa – who sounded very excited about visiting all of the children living in our local communities.

How has the past year been for you?

It's been very busy. Christmas may only come once a year but my workshop has a great deal to do from February until December. We have so many toys to make for boys and girls all over the world. The elves have been working hard while wearing masks and social distancing, and we're all very excited to bring some Christmas cheer to all of the boys and girls.

This Christmas will be a little different as a result of the pandemic, what advice do you have for the boys and girls to help you bring their gifts safely this year?

It's very important that the children go to bed early on Christmas Eve, and that there's a two-metre distance between us. While the elves have been working hard to ensure every child will get a present this Christmas, they might not get everything that they asked for in their letters to me this year. But the children in South Dublin County have been so good this year, and myself and the elves have made sure the boys and girls will get presents they'll enjoy! Some children are wondering

how Santa gets into apartments as there's no chimney?

Children need to remember that Santa and his reindeers are magic so they can get into any home, even if it doesn't have a chimney. And even if the children can't maintain a twometre distance from the Christmas tree where I leave the presents, once they're asleep I'll be able to deliver their gifts.

What preparations do you do the day before the big night?

I do everything I can to ensure my trip around the world goes smoothly. The elves make sure all the presents are packed into the sleigh and double-check the Christmas lists to make sure no presents have been forgotten. I make sure the reindeer – Prancer, Dancer, Donner, Blitzen, Dasher, Vixen, Comet and Rudolph – are all fed, happy, healthy and ready to go.

With all your journeys you have to make on Christmas Eve, would you need more than one Santa suit?

Since I'm travelling all over the world on Christmas Eve, I have different suits to suit different weather. All my suits look the same but some of them have more white fluff on them for the colder countries. Sometimes I also need a change of suit when I eat too many mince pies and my buttons pop off, or if I get stuck in a chimney and get covered in soot.

Have you ever got stuck up a chimney?

I got stuck in a chimney once in Tallaght and I was very lucky the fire wasn't lit. I had eaten a lot of Christmas pudding in a lot of houses and I couldn't fit my full belly down the chimney! The reindeers had to hold Rudolph's back legs and lower him down the chimney so that he could try and push me through. It was a very funny sight and eventually Rudolph managed to push me through and I was able to continue delivering all of my presents.

How many treats do you eat on Christmas Eve?

I don't eat all of the treats on Christmas Eve, I bring a lot of them home to Lapland and use Christmas magic to keep them fresh all year round. That way everyone back in the workshop in Lapland can share some of my favourite treats like cookies, mince pies and milk. What treats do you like being left out by children? Definitely Christmas pudding or a mince pie, and the reindeers love a carrot. I used to like the odd glass of Guinness, but I don't like to drink and fly so, if kids want to leave me out a glass of milk that would be lovely. I have to watch what I eat or I'll get stuck in a chimney again. Last Christmas, I ate too many goodies and all the buttons on my red suit jacket popped off. I actually lost one of my buttons in a house in Clondalkin and I couldn't find it. Maybe it's still there? **How do you spend your**

Christmas Day?

I love spending time with Mrs Claus, the elves and the reindeer on Christmas Day. Our friends the Easter Bunny and the Tooth Fairy usually come over for Christmas dinner as well. As you know I love my treats, but I really look forward to my turkey and vegetables for Christmas dinner, putting my feet up in front of the fire and watching television after a very busy Christmas Eve.

Any final message for the children?

Of course, to enjoy their new toys but what I really hope is that all of the children will try and make their parents' Christmas very special. It's not just Santa looking after Christmas you know, all of the mammies, daddies, nannies and grandads really help Santa in making Christmas a special time, so children should give their parents a big Christmas hug and say thank you

Safe home this Christmas

CRIME PREVENTION OFFICER SGT. CIARAN MCLOUGHLIN'S ADVICE

Every winter, the number of burglaries increases as the darker evenings draw in, but there are a number of measures people can take to protect their homes and belongings from would-be thieves.

Crime prevention officer Sergeant Ciaran McLoughlin, who is based in Rathfarnham Garda Station, offered some advice and tips for *Echo* readers to deter burglars this festive season.

"The message this year is to lock up and light up," he said. "Make sure windows and doors are locked and alarms are set.

"If you're not going to be home after dark then leave a light on in the house, so if someone's passing by the house it looks lived in." According to statistics released by An Garda Síochána, nearly half of burglaries occur between 5pm and 11pm.

Jewellery and cash remain the most common objects stolen, with €600 being the average value of goods taken.

"People shouldn't keep large sums of cash or expensive jewellery in their home, it should be put into safe storage," said Sgt McLoughlin.

"If you're storing these items at home, keep them in a good quality safe bolted to the floor or an internal wall."

Sgt McLoughlin also said that houses with old plastic house alarms with beacons at the bottom are also being targeted as it's often assumed that they no longer work, or they're not as effective as newer models.

He advised people to invest in newer models of home security, and said that doorbells with CCTV cameras and the use of sensor lights around properties can deter burglars.

If anyone sees anything suspicious, they should contact their local garda station.



Chocolate biscuit pudding

A LITTLE BREAK FROM TRADITION WITH THIS CHOCOLATE PUD

Ingredients – Pudding

375g biscuits, all digestive or a mixture of a few types 225g milk chocolate 225g dark chocolate 150g butter 225g golden syrup 100g marshmallows, raisins, Maltesers or whatever you like

Ingredients – Decoration

Ready-to-roll icing in white (250g), green and red. Icing sugar or cornflour to dust, edible glue, water or clear alcohol (vodka)

Method

Grease the pudding bowl well with butter. (This really helps the pudding to come out of the bowl easily when set).

Break half the biscuits into small pieces. Make the other half into fine crumbs using a blender or put them in a sandwich bag and bash with a rolling pin.

Melt the chocolate, butter and golden syrup together.

If you want your pudding to have a nice shiny appearance, spread a little of this mixture around the inside of the pudding bowl. You can also



reserve a little of it to make the top of the pudding smooth (which will be the bottom). Mix the melted mixture with all the bicsuits

and your chosen extra ingredient. Pour the mixture into the greased pudding bowl and push down well with a spoon. Bang the bowl on the counter to ensure there are no holes in the sides of the pudding. If you reserved any of the chocolate/butter/syrup mix, pour it on the top now.

Put it in the fridge to set overnight. If the pudding will not come out easily, pour some warm water over the outside of the bowl. **Decoration**

Dust your worksurface with icing sugar or cornflour and roll out the white icing to the desired thickness.

There are two ways to do the white icing – flat or on the bowl.

For the flat method, you can make a template from a piece of card to help. Put the template on top of the icing and cut around it using a roller cutter or sharp knife. Lay the cut icing on top of your pudding and smooth it down using your hands. Make your holly cake toppers.



Christmas Food HEALTHY LEFT OVERS CHICKEN / TURKEY SOUP

ith the new year approaching most of us after the over indulgence at christmas try to be more health conscious and eat well. these two recipes are the perfect kick start to get you eating healthily again. the leftover soup uses leftover roast chicken or turkey whichever you prefer along with some staple vegetables we all tend to have in the veggie press of the fridge. i made this along with my health I oaf brown bread a few days after christmas as i had tired of the heavy over indulgent food of the previous few days and believe me with every spoon full i could feel the goodness! it will also help with any head colds you may be battling with during the winter season. the soup you can make in a big batch and freeze while the health load makes two delicious loaves so plenty to go around and keep you on the straight and narrow post-christmas and into the new year. i am also bringing you a delicious light starter or christmas party food recipe which is perfect when entertaining this festive season, crab and avocado crostini! I ight, zesty and delicious and so easy to make.

john paul kennedy is a self-taught cook and an avid fan of collecting cookery books with a passion for good old-fashioned home cooking. his passion for proper family cooking stems from his two grandmothers who were both excellent cooks, one of whom was a trained chef. **jp** is also a christmas fanatic, so he has pulled together a selection of some of his family's favourite christmas recipes to share with you in the lead-up to christmas

- l eftovers Chicken / Turkey Soup 300g leftover roast chicken or turkey 3 carrots peeled and chopped into chunks 2 parsnips peeled and chopped into chunks 2 celery sticks washed and chopped
- 4 spring onions finely chopped
- tablespoon chopped parsley
- tablespoon chopped thyme

800ml hot chicken stock

2 tablespoons of chicken gravy granules (to thicken if preferred)

sea salt and ground black pepper for seasoning teaspoon of olive oil

Method

- 1. in a large casserole dish add the olive oil and on a medium heat cook all of the vegetables, herbs until tender - approx. 8- 10 minutes and stir frequently.
- 2. add the hot chick stock and mix well then season with salt and pepper and allow to simmer for 20 minutes with the lid on.
- 3. at the very end add the roast chicken / turkey leftovers to heat through and chicken gravy granules if you prefer a thicker consistency. if you prefer a more smooth soup you can blend with a hand-held belnder to your preferred consistency.
- serve immediately in large bowls with my delicious 4. brown bread health I oaf.

CRAB & AVOCADO CROSTINI

started making this recipe last Christmas as I wanted to introduce a new starter for Christmas that was light and the perfect bite size that could be whipped up and served to your guests while you're busy tinkering away in the kitchen putting the final flourishes to your Christmas feast. These crostinis are perfect for Christmas parties and are really quick and easy to prepare and simply delicious.

Ingredients - (Serves 6 people)

1 French baguette

- 200g pre-cooked crab meat
- 2 teaspoons of fresh lime juice
- 1 tablespoon of freshly chopped mint
- 2 avocados
- Pinch of cayenne pepper

2 tablespoons of olive or rapeseed oil

Sea salt & ground black pepper to season

Method

- 1. Preheat your oven to 180 degrees / gas mark 6
- 2. Thinly slice your baguette and lightly brush each slice with oil.
- Pop onto a baking tray and cook in the oven for 3 -4 minutes until lightly golden brown.
- 4. In a mixing bowl mix together the crab, mint and season with salt and pepper.



- 5. In a smaller bowl mash up the avocado, lime juice and cayenne pepper and add a pinch of sea salt.
- 6. Spread the mashed avocado mix over each slice of bread and top with the crab meat and adorn with a sprig of mint serve and enjoy.

Believe me this starter / party food will not long last. A good tip always is to buy your avocado a few days beforehand to ensure it's really soft and ripe. The bite sizes crostini's looks so appetizing and pretty on your serving platter and your guests will, I guarantee, be asking you for the recipe which you can see is super quick and easy to make.

Brown Bread Health loaf (Recipe makes two loaves)

Ingredients

450g wholemeal flour
65g wheat germ (extra for dusting)
65g wheat bran
65g plain flour
225g pinhead oatmeal
2 teaspoons of soft light-brown sugar
2 teaspoons of bicarb/bread soda
1 litre of buttermilk

Topping:

2 teaspoons of wheat germ 2 teaspoons of sesame seeds

Method

- 1. Preheat your oven to 230° Celsius / 450F / Gas mark 8.
- 2. Put all the dry ingredients into a large mixing bowl.
- Stir in the buttermilk and combine – this will make a very moist dough.
- Grease two loaf tins and dust with some wheat germ and divide the dough between the two tins – this will prevent them from sticking to your tins.



- Sprinkle some wheat germ and sesame seeds on top of both loaves and pop into the oven.
- 6. Bake for 10 minutes and then reduce the temperature to $130^{\circ}/250f$ / $\frac{1}{2}$ gas mark and bake for an hour.
- 7. When the loaves are baked remove from the oven and allow to cool in their tins before turning them out to cool completely.



Slice and lather with real Irish butter and serve with my leftover Turkey soup for a delicious and nutritious lunch or supper.


Have we time now for each other?







Over the Christmas period, as everyone is unwrapping their new presents, the council has urged people to think about the environment as we produce a whopping 54kgs in extra packaging per household.

Ireland has built up a bad reputation for its attitude towards climate change, and the recent revelations that the state is ranked last in the European rankings has inspired us to make a list on how you can cut down on waste over the holidays, save energy and some money in the process.

- A great stocking filler this Christmas could be a reusable water bottle or coffee cup, as it is estimated that in Ireland alone, 200 million takeaway cups end up in landfill. Also most coffee shops offer discounts if you bring your own cup.

The industry plays a large role in human-induced climate change as palm oil plantations have wiped out some of the world's most expansive forests and decreased the orangutan population in Sumatra and Borneo by over 20,000. Iceland released an advertisement all about how palm oil is affecting the environment – check it out – it's haunting.





Star-topped Lemon Pastry Mince Pies

You can makes these with grated orange zest if you prefer and always chill your pastry cases in the fridge before you bake them, they will be more crumbly and buttery as a result!

Ingredients (Makes 16-20)

200g plain flour

- The zest of one lemon
- 1 tablespoon of icing sugar
- 100g chilled unsalted butter
- 1 egg, beaten, plus a little extra for brushing
- 700g Christmas mincemeat (Homemade or good-
- quality shop brand) A little melted butter for greasing your baking tins

Method

- 1. Preheat your oven to 220° Celsius and lightly grease your muffin/fairy cake tins.
- 2. Pop the flour, lemon zest, icing sugar and butter into a food processor and whizz briefly.
- Add half the beaten egg and blend together you might need to add a little more egg, but not too much as the pastry shouldn't be too moist, you just want it to come together.
- 4. Bring the pastry together, shape into a disc, wrap in clingfilm and pop into the fridge for 30 minutes to 1 hour.
- 5. On a lightly floured surface roll out the pastry to

Minding the Mind at Christmas

THE COVID PANDEMIC AND THE CHRISTMAS BREAK

The Covid-19 pandemic makes the Christmas break both more complicated and more necessary than ever.

How can we navigate the holiday, the festivities and family gatherings, so that we connect with each other, enjoy the break, and stay as safe as possible? We need Christmas, so it is important to plan it well.

The first thing to remember is that people are in very different places with their experiences, beliefs and anxieties about Covid.

With this in mind, try to make it easy for people who want to hold back a little, people who prefer smaller gatherings, and people who are a little embarrassed by their anxiety. We need to give each other a lot of leeway this year.

If you are hosting a gathering, be sure to invite everyone whom you are comfortable to have but offer face-saving ways for people to say no if they wish.

Many people will cut back to just a few key gatherings this Christmas, and we should respect that. Different people have different levels of anxiety.

Following public health guidance will reassure many people: limiting numbers and pointing out that anyone with symptoms should not attend any gatherings.

Planning is everything. Many people treated Christmas like a military operation prior to the pandemic, and this approach has finally come into its own.

For example, if you are hosting, try to leave some chairs outside if you can, so that people who are anxious can sit outside without needing to attract attention by asking.

If you are not happy when you arrive at a gathering, just go home. As host, if someone suddenly says that they want to go home early, invite them to stay, but do not pressure them: just accept that they might be acting out of



anxiety or grief that you do not understand. They might be more comfortable at home. We need to respect that.

We cannot avoid talking about Covid. So, rather than banning the topic from the dinner-table from the get-go (which is tempting), maybe discuss it for a while and then forbid any Covid-focussed discussions for an hour.

If people engage you in long one-to-one conversations about Covid, the best strategy is to listen without necessarily agreeing or disagreeing.

Many such conversations are fuelled by anxiety and grief, more than logic. Listening is the best possible gift.

Many people want to tell their story from the last few months in great detail. You do not need to agree with their position or decisions, but listening is a powerful form of validation.

Plan activities. A physical activity like walking is the best way to interrupt negative thoughts, anxieties or conversations that stubbornly refuse to move on from Covid. Focusing on children, gifts, and pets also helps.

Alcohol fuels both doom-laden conversations and breaches of Covid regulations. This will make many people anxious and will increase the risk for everyone.

That is not to say that this has to be an alcoholfree Christmas, but maybe an alcohol-aware Christmas, in the interests of everyone.

Finally, devote time to an activity that absorbs you over the Christmas break, be it gardening, music, running, swimming, knitting, jigsaws, meditation or yoga. Sometimes, becoming lost in the moment is precisely what we need.

In the words of philosopher Henry David Thoreau: "Happiness is like a butterfly; the more you chase it, the more it will elude you, but if you turn your attention to other things, it will come and sit softly on your shoulders".





Drinkaware to stay safe on the roads this Christmas season

he public are reminded to stay safe on the roads this Christmas and to be mindful of driving the morning after drinking and to never ever drink and drive.

and to never ever drink and drive. Drinkaware have issued a reminder to the public ahead of the Christmas holidays this year to practice caution and safety when driving. People are encouraged to fully understand and acknowledge processing times for alcohol. According to Drinkaware, 1 in 10 DUI arrests are made between 8am and 2pm, with a peak on Sundays. This Christmas, Drinkaware's simple road safety message is to

This Christmas, Drinkaware's simple road safety message is to understand exactly what a standard drink is, and how long it typically takes the body to process one. CEO of Drinkaware, Sheena Horgan, commented: "RSA figures are that 1 in 4 people admitted to getting behind the wheel the morning after while over the limit. "These are avoidable risks that all drivers need to be more aware of to

drivers need to be more aware of to keep our roads safe this festive season. It is vital that people know how long it typically takes the body to process a standard measure of alcohol, when it is safe to drive, and what a standard drink actually is.'

According to Drinkaware guidelines, it takes at least one hour to process one standard drink, which is either a half pint of beer, 100ml glass of wine or a standard



pub measure (35ml) of spirits. This time begins from when the last drink is finished. For example, if a person finished three pints of beer at 1am, they will have consumed 6 standard drinks and this means they need six hours from midnight when they stopped drinking before their body will have processed the alcohol and they

should not get behind the wheel of a car until 7am at the earliest. These are just guidelines, and many things such as your weight, age, gender, metabolism, mood and whether you've eaten can further delay the processing time. "Good intentions are not enough Without the right information, people may be making unsafe

choices," Sheena Horgan added. "Knowing when it is safe to drive the morning after a drink protects us all. Drinkaware is therefore urging the public to stay safe and informed this holiday season. Listen to the advice of the RSA and an Garda Síochána and let's be proactive about keeping our roads safe.

Report by South Dublin County Chamber sites the challenges facing local businesses

INTENSIFYING economic and demographic pressures facing South Dublin County, will need to be aligned with national, regional and local policy more closely, to ensure a healthy balance of growth, according to a new report by South Dublin Chamber. Commissioned by South Dublin Chamber, 'Building

on Success', is both a follow on from the Chamber's 2020 report "Ensuring inclusive recovery in the Greater Dublin Region" and also a response to significant developments affecting the national and local economy

The extensive report cites the challenges facing supply chains, and the impact that Brexit and the pandemic has presented.

It says, Brexit, in particular, has led to "onshoring" by manufacturers and distributors to hedge against serious supply chain disruptions and these trends are happening at a "faster rate than what was anticipated last year". In a foreword, Eamonn Egan, President South Dublin

Chamber, says the report shares "our views on how best we can continue to grow our local economy and what challenges we see ahead".

"The challenges that await us on our path to growth are energy supply and cost, public transport, our road network, land availability in the right places for economic and enterprise and housing. We now have a positive future to build on our current success by addressing the challenges before us. All our work must also be seen through the lens of our commitment to the UN's Strategic Development Goals.

The report highlights "significant population growth in the decade to date" and "strong forecasted growth,

possibly greater than expected, out to 2028." It says rapidly rising inflation, to which both supply chain pressures and higher energy costs, are contributing circuit from the terms. significantly to this.

In terms of alignment to national and local policies, the Chamber say this needs to address access to key resources such as labour, transport, land and energy, to ensure that no economically, socially or environmentally

It also calls for an alignment of land supply for enterprise, employment and housing, particularly considering expected population and housing growth in South Dublin County along the N7. Another policy conclusion is the

need for more radial public transport, to connect major population centres in Tallaght Clondalkin and Lucan with more centres of employment, and the provision of clean, affordable local energy sources in line with Programme for Government commitments.

39% of people feel organisations equipped for long term hybrid

ALMOST three quarters of IT leaders would refuse or quit a job if they were not offered the option of remote/hybrid working.

According to a survey by Parkwest IT provider Auxilion, the findings also revealed some 42 per cent think the most likely workstyle for their organisation going forward as restrictions continue to ease will be mainly remote working with half days in the office.

The survey – conducted by Mediateam and involving 100 IT decision makers in Ireland – found just 39 per cent feel their organisation is well equipped for long-term hybrid working and some 52 per cent rate their company as being only somewhat equipped for same. The research also revealed that 45

per cent of IT leaders are not confident in their organisation's ability to manage and secure remote staff's home environments.

Almost half of respondents also disclosed that they don't think their organisation has adequate security and data loss prevention measures in place.

Respondents said that one of the biggest challenges for businesses when employees return to a hybrid workplace is having adequate IT security measures for devices across locations. Philip Maguire, CEO, Auxilion, said: "There is a clear disconnect between what the future workplace looks like and the security strategies that Irish organisations currently have in place. Hybrid is happening, but businesses are not fully prepared and are potentially leaving their company and people open to attack.

"As well as adequate protection to safeguard systems and staff working across multiple locations, organisations need to invest to ensure that the user experience remains streamlined and optimised – regardless of where teams are. Only then can they effectively secure company networks, enable people to be productive and support business growth in the hybrid working world."

77 dwellings planned for rugby club football grounds

CLONDALKIN Rugby Football Club (RFC) has endorsed a developers' plan to develop 77 dwellings in Gordon Park, following the sale of the property.

A rapidly expanding rugby club, Clondalkin RFC recently sold its land at Gordon Park to private developer, Greenwalk Development Limited, to fund the purchase of a larger parcel of land and upgrade of facilities to meet the increasing demands.

It was reported in August that *The Echo* understood the deal was believed to be worth in the region of €4 million.

€4 million. Now, Greenwalk Development Ltd has filed a planning application seeking permission to develop 63 two-storey houses and 14 apartment and duplex units at Gordon Park in Kingswood.

The plans also include the demolition of the existing building on site of around 455sq.m and all elements of the proposal are contained within the 2.28 hectare site off the Old Naas Road.

The houses break down into eight two-bed houses and 55 three-bed houses whereas the apartments break down into seven one-bed ground-floor apartments and seven duplex units overhead.

All 14 apartment and duplex units will be accommodated into a single three-storey building.

A new vehicular entrance at the south-west corner of the site is included within the plans.

It is proposed to provide 10 of the 77 units for social housing - two three-bed houses, four three-bed duplexes and four one-bed apartments.

In a letter attached with the planning application, Clondalkin RFC is hoping to develop four/five pitches and a children's pitch, clubhouse with 5/6 dressing rooms and gym at its new land in Baldonnel.

"The funding from Greenwalk

Development Ltd will cover a significant amount of our expenditure over the forthcoming years," the letter written by Clondalkin RFC Chairperson, Gerry Gilligan, reads.

"This will set our club up for the next 50 years and enable us to provide sporting facilities to the population of South County Dublin and neighbouring areas. "We fully endorse the planning application from Greenwalk Development Ltd for housing

development on Gordon Park." Links Childare, which is located at the entrance of Citywest Business Campus on the Old Naas Road, also requested that scheme not include a creche as "it will financially upset" their operation and "will result in job losses".

South Dublin County Council are due to make a decision on the planning application by February 2, 2022.

AN APPLICATION showing a revised plan for the partconstructed housing development at Cornerpark in Newcastle has been lodged with South Dublin County Council.

Dragonglen Limited filed the new planning application seeking permission to make an amendment to units 10 to 15 at Cornerpark Rise, Cornerpark Townland off the Peamount Road in Newcastle.

Plans are for the construction of six two-storey, threebedroom terraced dwellings and all associated site development works, car parking, landscaping, open spaces, public lighting and connections to fouls and water-drainage/attenuation systems and mains water supply.

"The proposed development represents an amendment to the existing partially completed development as it relates to the above-mentioned plots," the application reads.

Permission was first granted for the Cornerpark development in November 2019.

The local planning authority granted permission

subject to a list of 24 conditions - that were required to be met.

One of the conditions was in relation to the road network within the subject site and required that Road One cease prior to the front of Units 13 and 14.

Units 14 to 19 were required to be relocated in a westerly direction with footpath, privacy strip and private amenity space for units 13 and 14 absorbed into the space.

A bin storage was also included in part of the condition.

This new planning application, which was filed on December 9, is being sought to amend the already approved scheme as set out in a revised compliance layout approved by the council in August, 2021.

The application is being made on foot of the aforementioned conditions by making provision for a vehicular access and footpath to the north boundary of the development.

This new application relates a site area of 0.15 hectares at the six units.



New Youth Club Opens In Fettercairn

Fettercairn's new youth club had its official opening and first meeting on Friday, November 19, in St. Anne's Primary School. Over 50 parents and young people attended the opening, at which music was provided by Ragamuffin Ballad Group, led by local lad, Tommy Smith.

Fettercairn Youth Club is now meeting each Friday night and three Mondays out of four at the school. It caters for boys and girls between 13 and 20; and the facilities currently available include pool, tabletennis, darts and draughts.

The club was the idea of local parents who had become concerned about the lack of facilities in Fettercairn and the possible attractions of vandalism, horse-riding and car-thieving.

According to the club committee, when they first met in St. Anne's to discuss the problem they received tremendous support from school Principal. Gus Kelly, community worker, Sr. Hanna, and local priest. Pat Littleton. That support and the helpful suggestions of the youngsters, especially Mark Kavanagh, helped to get the club launched. Parents involved with the club feel that the great response from the youth themselves is an assurance of the club's success, and, with a fund-raising committee now bent on getting money for expansion, there are high hopes for the future.

Committee members include Chairman. Liam Collins, Secretary, Joe Farrell, and Treasurer. Eamonn Doyle. There are four junior members on the senior committee as well as a separate junior committee of 12.

Rapid Rail Will Not Interfere with Ballymount Castle

A CIE spokesman has confirmed that plans for the propsed rapid transit railway through Ballymount have been redrawn so as to avoid interference with Ballymount Castle and its associated group of old buildings.

In re-routing the line to by-pass the historical site at a safe distance. CIE is following the example of Dublin County Council, which recently revised its plans for the Western Parkway Road following concerted public objection to its proposed passage through the site. The CIE spokesman was quick to point out that the new rail link between

The CIE spokesman was quick to point out that the new rail link between Tallaght and the city is not planned for completion until 1981. And its development to actuality is subject to Government approval and funding. Consideration of such approval awaits the completion of the first stage of the rapid transit system that between Howth and Bray. Electrification of the Howth Bray line is expected to be finished in 1984.

"If the electric railway to Tallaght via Ballymount does come to fruition, it will be a surface line, and will not go underground either at Ballymount or thereabouts, the spokesman promised.

He received his education in Glongowes Wood, Trinity College and Oxford.


In his youth, Norman De Vere was top-class athlete, specialising in 440 and 880 vard dashes.

Among his proudest achievements were races won in the Tailteann Games and in London's White City.



A Christmas Eve in Tallaght, 1932

FROM A RAMBLE AROUND TALLAGHT

n the afternoon of Christmas Eve 1932, John Finnegan set out from his mother's house in Roundtown on a tram to Tallaght, intending to stretch his legs and to take the country air before the festivities of Christmas got underway. Arriving in Tallaght village at two o'clock, he intended to walk up to

Brittas, a five and a half mile stretch, or a two hour walk, and would be in plenty of time to get the five o' clock tram from Brittas back to Roundtown.

The tram was to be discontinued later that week, after over forty-five years' service and it would be John Finnegan's last chance to journey on the Dublin to Blessington tramline. The afternoon was fresh but dry. Stepping off the car Finnegan inhaled deeply, filling his lungs with the fresh country air rolling off the Dublin Mountains. Tightening the laces of his sturdy walking boots and fastening his galoshes over his ankles he set out west, through the old village past Dr Lydon's Dispensary and Ms Martin's post-office. He loitered briefly at the little pocket park at the top of the town, opposite O'Neill's bar and grocery, which had once been the site of Tallaght's ancient Cross

Passing the old Commons of Tallaght he made his way toward Tallaght Hill, Mount Seskin and Knockannavea. A white tonsure of frost sat on the peaks of the hills around Tallaght, like a pope's cap or the head of a monk. The walk up to Jobstown was a gentle enough stroll, relatively flat and with good paths. He knew the walk would begin proper just beyond Jobstown and before Kiltalown Cottages, where he would take a left, leaving the main Blessington road and sharply ascending west along the slope of Mount Seskin.

There Finnegan could feel his heart beating in his chest, exhaling warm and deep breaths into the cold thin air. He looked down over the fields at what remained of Johnville, the once stately mansion and one-time home to Mr Nicholas Roe of the famous Roe Whiskey family and later the setting of Dr Luther's Hydrotherapy Spa before the mysterious Doctor removed to **Belfast**

There was no better way to prepare for the Christmas celebrations in the coming day. He thought of the hearty meal he would have the next day and the few glasses of sherry or tawny port in the evening before parlour games. A walk in the country would build his appetite for the indulgences to follow.

Traversing the crest of Mount Seskin he could see the pond at Brittas, built to take water to the old Saggart Paper Mills- beyond Adam and Eve, the famous standing stones on the road to Saggart- its little canal stretching beyond the area on his OS map labelled Clearwater Commons and Cooldown Commons. To the north, he

He had walked at least four miles, maybe more, and it seemed the further he walked the more remote and further from civilisation he became. The air felt damp as the late evening passed. And then the rain arrived. He walked for several hours, at times it seemed in circles. He thought he could hear the water of the river Dodder. The night became inky black, his boots heavy with clods as the gravel path descended to a track of clay. The last bus from Bohernabreena would be long gone

He could hear in the distance the flow of the brown and yellow waters of the river on his left. He must have crossed Callaghan's bridge, he thought, but had no memory of it. He had read once of Arthur Ussher, who had been washed away by this river, when it was a raging torrent back in 1628 and had heard of the many men since who had fallen to its humours. It was along these banks Mrs Kearney had watched her sons and

Finnegan felt himself now to be the subject of a conspiracy- "a conspiracy of starlings", he thought. "No. Ravens. That's it" his mind was wandering. Whether it was this, or the cold and sheer exhaustion, he began to shake

hour. He saw a sign on the road in the distance, indicating Bohernabreena-1.5 miles. He had thought it was further. A little over one mile, and forty minutes of light left! If he walked briskly he might catch a glimpse of the great waterworks and could get the evening bus from Bohernabreena back to Roundtown. He would be home in time for tea. Just before leaving the main road, he paused to read a little cross, erected at the side of the tram tracks- 'Patrick Gooling. 1903. RIP'

He marched on. At least it was all downhill. There was nothing for it but to keep going. It must have been four, perhaps five hours since the light had fallen. This was not how he had envisaged his ramble when he had been reading his little book The Neighbourhood of Dublin.

He had no idea where he was but knew he could go no further. Resting under the dead or dying canopy of an ancient Oak, he sat on a heap of stones gathered at the trunk and listened to the sound of rain, drenching the canvas of wilting leaves above his head. He shook off his hat, sending a spray of water into a puddle before him. Damp and down spirited, he lay back against the trunk and lit a cigarette- a Player's Wills. And then another. He cupped in his hands the little round spirit-lighter, made from two coins welded together by his father during the Great War- a gift he had received for his eighteenth birthday. He could feel the metal warm in his hands. Finnegan mused that if he had just got the last tramcar from Brittas, he would be home now in Roundtown, sitting by the fire.

He lit another cigarette, and out of habit looked at his wrist- remembering again that he had left his watch at home. He had no idea what time it was, but knew it was late. Slumped against the tree, he resigned himself to the fact that he was lost.

The wind rustled the leaves overhead, when a thin horizontal ribbon of light between a cluster of bushes broke through in the distance. It was a homestead, not six hundred metres away. Suddenly filled with a renewed optimism and energy he jumped up and, oblivious now to the rain pouring down upon him, marched in a stupor with his head down towards the light. He could no longer feel his feet, conscious only that he must put one foot in front of the other.

A set of heavy wrought iron entrance gates hung between a pair of matching twin piers, taller than a man, each

topped with an ornamental globe. A short gravel path of about 10 yards, sheltered by a line of mature silver birch trees led to the door of the house.

Passing through the gates he could hear the crunch of gravel under his feet- Terra Firma. Briskly, almost mindlessly, approaching the residence, he could see nine sash windows of a fine house, its corners partially covered with ivy. A pair of elongated narrow windows, one on each side of the door, and each dressed with red curtains, were faintly illuminated by candle light.

Finnegan paused before ascending the nine granite steps leading to the hall door, kicking the mucky clods off his boots against the second step. A wreath of entwined Holly and Ivy hung on the doorknob, an unpolished brass affair.

Giving three timid taps on the brass knocker above the wreath, he waited in silence, watching his own warm breath condense against the black door. After a few moment he rapped again- tap,

tap, tap. He could hear a presence inside, fumbling about. "Thanks be to God", he thought. He heard the shuffle of slippers on linoleum before a bar was removed from inside the hall door and a lock turned. The door was opened half way, and in the light stood an elderly white-haired man. He was unshaven, tall and portly, slightly hunched, as very old men can sometimes be. A paraffin lamp silently flickered on a stand in the hallway and moths flapped about overhead, lightly tapping their wings inside the glass in the fanlight over the door. It was a substantial residence, though one that had seen better days.

death," the host implored.

Noticing a small silver holy water well on the wall beside the door, Finnegan went to dip his forefinger in the water to bless himself- as much to let his host know he was a good Christian, than out of any habit. Finding the font to be dry he tipped his forehead with a thumb, and then his chest with the dry forefinger, before resigning his effort at piety.

The old man's face was broad and bearded, his cheeks ruddy. Finnegan removed his galoshes and wiped his boots on a stiff and well-worn mat, draping the soiled galoshes over an umbrella stand that contained nothing but a single riding crop.

"Let me take your coat," his host muttered, hanging the coat on a hook on the wall opposite the water-font.

He motioned with a nod towards a door a few metres down the hall and without a word ushered Finnegan into a comfortable but dimly lit parlour. Two tall Rathborne candles gently flickered at either end of the mantelpiece as the cold air from the hallway entered the parlour. Smouldering coals glowed in the fireplace, the dying embers of what looked to have been a generous fire.

"Sit down there and dry yourself off. How does a man find himself out here at this time of night"? The old man enquired. Finnegan told him his talehow he had intended to get the tram home from Brittas, but decided to extend his walk to Bohernabreena. "That's a good walk alright! Another seven miles bedad!" Finnegan realised either the road-sign had been wrong or he had misread it. Either way, he had lost his bearings somewhere between there and here.

A fire of turf sat smouldering in the grate and a downdraft in the chimney again sent a plume of smoke into the room as the old man opened the parlour door to get a glass for his guest. It was nice just to be indoors, sitting by the warmth of the dying embers in the hearth. A fender and a set of ancient fire-irons sat beside the hearth-plate, looking somewhat out of place- almost too small for the great fireplace beside which they sat.

The steaming mixture filled the air with a homely cheer.

Finnegan raised the glass, inhaling the vapour of the glowing spirit deep into his lungs. He was just about to put the glass to his lips, when he realised his host did not have a glass "Are you not taking one yourself? It is a bad guest I would be, who would drink whiskey on his own. I don't believe it's something I've ever done before.


"Ay, my days of drinking Whiskey, man, are long gone. I drank up my share, in my own day. It's ten years since a drop of whiskey or anything else has passed my lips. It's a bad host I would be if you didn't drink it.

Finnegan, stretching his legs in front of the fire, took a sip of the whiskey and felt the warm stream running down his throat and into his chest.

A long garland of Holly and $I\nu y_{\text{r}}$ loosely entwined dressed the mantelpiece. In the centre was a large ivory clock. Finnegan was taken-aback when he noticed the time on it- six minutes past ten. "Is that clock right, can I ask? I thought it was later.

"And a lot later it is too, I'm afraid. That old clock hasn't ticked in over thirty years. Not since we lost the key for it. It was a very fine clock in its day, a gift my father received from Mr Nicholas Reade, the previous owner of this place. It came to me with the house."

The men spoke for some time- the host telling his guest that he had walked a great deal himself when he was younger and knew the local hills well. As a young man he had been something of a wrestler and had trained in the hills of Ballinscorney. He had been involved in the public affairs of the district and had chaired meetings of the league. After an hour the men moved to retire for the night, the host raking what remained of the dying coals in the grate. Departing the parlour the old man handed Finnegan a



tall red candle, matching his own, to light the way.

Standing in the Hall at the foot of a staircase, the old man paused at a large portrait that hung on the wall- a portrait of two men standing side-by-. side. "That is Charles Stewart Parnell," he said. Motioning towards the other man in the painting, he continued "and that is my Father". He stared at the great picture wistfully and both men stood for a few moments studying the portrait of the two bearded figures

The old man gripped Finnegan's left wrist, squeezing it warmly but firmly in his fist, causing the candle in Finnegan's hand to shed a light splattering of wax down on the damp cuff of his sleeve- "Look- Look into their eyes! Great men. They took a country, a nation in hand. Leaders of men, both. Both dead. Gone. Gone forever." Finnegan could feel the old man had never lost his wrestlers grip. "Our time will come," he said. "Our time will come. And we too will be gone.'

After a moment of silence the man led Finnegan up the adjacent staircase and down a hallway, into a bedroom in the corner of the house. "There is an extra blanket at the foot of the bed, if you need it. Will I leave a candle?" the old man asked, as he shuffled toward the door.

"No. Thank you. The one I have is all the light I need. Thank you," Finnegan replied.

The room was basic- a bed and a bedside table on which sat an empty enamel jug. It's certainly not the Gresham Hotel, he thought. A pair of pictures with matching frames hung on the bedroom wall beside the door- one of what looked like a Thrush and the other a Deer. Finnegan turned to the window. He could hear the distant sound of a cat wailing in the yard below- the cry of a new born baby. He stared into the darkness outside, cupping the light of the candle away from the glass. As his eyes adjusted to the darkness, he could see in the moonlight, the faint silhouette of the ruins of an old square tower just metres from the house.

Turning away from the window, he caught a reflection of himself in the candle light. For a moment he thought there was another man outside. He was tired and still not entirely himself. He wondered in whose bed he was about to sleep. The white sheet was cold and

a little damp, but it felt good to set himself down on the bed. He lay his arms across his chest under the sheet, to stay warm. His eyelids became heavy. The last thing he saw was his own whiskey breath, rise into the damp night air above him.

He slept soundly til the morning and was awakened by something at the end of the bed. A cat or a dog- lying against his left foot. He could feel the weight of it baring down on him.

Opening his eyes he found a great canopy of brown leaves mottled with blue breaking through above him. A young countryman was standing over him, gently nudging his foot, with his boot. "Troth! Thanks be to God you are alive. I thought you were dead by the way you were slumped against that tree. You wouldn't be the first man to die under a tree, on a night like that. Have you been there all night?'

Finnegan took a moment to compose himself, unsure exactly of where he was. "I'm afraid so. I think so," he replied looking around at the field surrounding him and the tree above. Standing up to stretch out his limbs he began to make sense of the situation-"I took shelter under the tree from the rain last night. I must have fallen asleep.

"Are you from the city," the countryman inquired. "I am," replied Finnegan, "Well, near enough"

'Come. I have a cart on the road. I will drop you some of the way there. I saw you lying in the field and thought you were done for."

The two men walked toward a cart on the road- about forty yards. Finnegan got into the jaunting cart, a two seater trap with a black canopy. The men sat in silence for a few minutes, as the countryman lashed the single grey horse

A great cape of frost lay cloaking the hills behind them- on Glenasmole and Knockannavea, on Mount Seskin and Seefingan, melting, as the sun rose, down into the Dodder. All it's little tributaries running into one- under the bridge at Oldbawn, and down behind the Carmelite Monastery in Firhouse and further on down and down past the Gasworks near old Mr. Pidgeon's House at Ringsend. The moon, still high in the sky, held up like a host over the hills of Ballinascorney by forces poorly understood, by those who laboured and worshiped under its light.

It was a clear Christmas morning, the brisk air breaking on Finnegan's cheeks. He could feel a cold but gentle breeze on his neck as the cab made its way north through Oldbawn toward the little village of Tallaght and then east to Balrothery and on to Templeogue.

A smell of turf-smoke lingered on his collar. Finnegan hunched his shoulders under the damp coat and put his hands in its pockets to keep warm. In his right-hand pocket he could feel what remained of his damp packet of Player's Wills cigarettes and the little round lighter.

In his other pocket he felt something heavy, but familiar on his wrist. Taking his hand out to look, he found on his wrist an old and unfamiliar watch- a heavy silver timepiece, with four Roman Numerals- XII- III- VI- IX. He had never seen it before. On the cuff of his shirt, just above the watch- a small red stain- a drop of dried red candle wax- all that remained of his Christmas Eve in Tallaght, 1932, and the house with red curtains.







Basketball Ireland first NGB to win Cara Xcessible Silver Award

AFTER having scooped the Cara Xcessible Bronze Award in 2020, Basketball Ireland has become the first National Governing Body in Ireland to be awarded the Cara Xcessible Silver Award. Ellen Walshe from Templeogue set six new PBs, five Irish senior record times and won silver in the 400m IM at the World Short Course Swimming Championships in Abu Dhabi

Sweeney hails record-breaking performances of Walshe in World Championships

WHAT a difference a year makes! That's something Ellen Walshe can certainly attest to.

Back in December of 2020, the Templeogue swimmer suffered a bad fall that resulted in some nerve damage, making it very difficult to even walk for some time.

But 12 months on, the 20-year-

old has not only competed in her first Olympic Games, but has emerged from this week's World Short Course Swimming Championships in Abu Dhabi as one of the leading lights for Ireland.

In addition to the stunning silver medal she captured on the 400m Individual Medley on Thursday last, the Tokyo Olympian chalked up no less than six PBs and five Irish senior records at the event. Now based at University of Tennessee along with compatriot Mona McSharry under a team led by head coach Matt Kredich, Walshe broke the 27-year-old Irish 400m IM record in Abu Dhabi when she touched home in a time of 4:30.78, knocking more than six seconds off the Irish standard that had been set by Michelle Smith back in 1994.

And she bettered that time again in the final, clocking 4:26.52 to secure Ireland's second-ever medal at a World Swimming Championships and the first ever in an Olympic event.

Following on from that, Walshe set a new Irish record in the 200m Individual Medley when she clocked 2:08.69 in her heat.

Her fifth and final new national standard came in the 100m Butterfly semi-finals in which she finished ninth.

Having broken her own Irish senior best in the heats with a time of 57.32, she again lowered it in the next round, setting a new national best of 56.68, that saw her miss out on the final by a mere 0.06 of a second.

For Templeogue SC coach Brian Sweeney who trained Walshe for near to ten seasons before her move to the US earlier this year, the standards his young protégé has been setting throughout 2021 have been a long time coming. "It's incredible to see her realise that level of potential that we know has always been there" he told The Echo. "To put some context on it, on

"To put some context on it, on the 11th of December last year she went to the physical therapist with the injury she had sustained and on the 12th of December this year she flew out for what was ultimately the most successful week of her career to date.

"Ellen suffered a spinal concussion after she fell down the stairs and ended up with some potential nerve damage to her foot. That was potentially a career-threatening injury. "But, in a weird way, the injury

that she had, because it compromised her natural flow in the water, I think reconnected her with a lot of the things that she does incredibly well.

does incredibly well. "Intuitively it allowed her to feel how much better and stronger she was getting in the water during that run-in from January to February through to the Trials and Performance Meet.

"And in that process of rehabilitation she got to redefine everything she does naturally, grow confidence in it and then move it to the Olympics. "From there it's just been

stratospheric in terms of her own confidence and awareness of her ability.

"I think from that point onwards, when you realise you're able to be internationally relevant and competitive, it's huge.

competitive, it's huge. "We've seen some fantastic stuff from Ellen over the years and some of those swims have been coming for a long time.

"I think in the last 24 months, she's matured a lot, she's grown in confidence and qualifying for the Olympics has made her fully aware and appreciative of her potential.

"She's settled very well in the States. There's a great crew of people there supporting her in that programme. "The team in Tennessee have

"The team in Tennessee have been very impressed with Ellen's skills and abilities and she's just garnered a level of confidence from that environment. "She gets to challenge herself

"She gets to challenge herself from a racing perspective on a much more frequent basis. "The most incredible thing about Ellen is her discipline and diligence to train, particularly throughout the lockdown. She's very focused and she has a clear vision around what she wants.

"She's got excellent swimming skills that have been developed from grassroots right the way through and she's damn fast as well" he laughed. Meanwhile this week's World

Meanwhile this week's World Short Course Championships also saw Tallaght SC and National Centre swimmer Brendan Hyland help the Ireland Men's 4x100m Freestyle Relay team to a new Irish record.

The Knocklyon man combined with Calum Bain, Jack McMillan and Jordan Sloan to help card a new national best time of 3:12.94 as they came home ninth in their heat, missing out on the final by just .2 of a second. Fellow Tallaght swimmer Niamh

Fellow Tallaght swimmer Niamh Coyne clocked a time of 2:23.04 on her way to 14th place in the 200m Breaststroke having emerged 18th over the 100m distance with a time of 1:06.44 that saw her just miss out on a place in the semi-final by two positions.

than seeing academy players develop and do well in the first team, so I'm really looking forward to being involved" he


said. Certainly St Pat's manager Clancy, is pleased at Daly's addition to his team,


saying "Jon has a lot of experience in professional football over the last 20 years as both a player and a coach and I'm very happy to welcome him to the club.
