Operational staff on grass-cutting duties reminded about leaving hard surfaces clean

SOUTH Dublin County Council's Council's Public Realm Operations staff carry out the vast majority of grass-cutting in the county, with only the meadow mowing programme assigned to contractors.

According to the council, the issue of grass cuttings left behind on hard surfaces is one that Public Realm management and supervisory staff are mindful of and raise with operational staff on a regular basis. When

conditions for grass-cutting are good – that is the grass is dry and not excessively long – then the issue of grass cuttings left on hard surfaces does not arise in general.

Grass cuttings can build up on grass-cutting machinery and then be deposited on the ground for a number of reasons. These include the necessity to continue to cut grass even when it is wet, the wet grass cuttings stick together in a clump and then

drop off when the mower hits a hard surface.

In some circumstances there is excessive driving on and over footpaths and in these circumstances staff are instructed to keep this to a minimum.

Where crossing a footpath is unavoidable then it should be done with care to avoid the depositing of grass cuttings on the footpath. Where this does occur however it is the

responsibility of the mower operator, and the supervisor, to ensure that the area is cleaned afterwards.

Regular cleaning of mowers is also required to maintain the mowers in good condition, but also to remove any build-up of grass cuttings.

Public Realm management and supervisory staff will continue to monitor this issue and remind staff as necessary of the standard that is required.

Tackling litter problem costs over €9m per year

South Dublin Council employs five full-time litter wardens

TACKLING litter is costing the public up to €9 million per year, with South Dublin County Council employing five full-time litter wardens and providing different services to address the issue.

At the recent full meeting of South Dublin County Council, Cllr Charlie O'Connor asked for a report into how litter issues are dealt with.

In response, the council outlined that five full-time litter wardens operate throughout the

county but are assigned the specific areas for operational purposes.

The public realm section of the local authority provides a variety of cleansing services, with on-street litter bins services daily and daily cleaning of town and village centres.

Parks undergo daily cleaning while there is mobile cleansing crews dedicated to cleaning and litter-picking in parks and estate open spaces, including response to illegal dumping and collections from community clean-up events.

Oxygen Environmental Ltd provides the road-sweeping service under contract to the council, with Public Realm painting staff working to aid in graffiti removal.

In relation to tackling graffiti, the council is currently procuring for a specialist contractor in graffiti removal from block and stone face walls, along with other specialist graffiti removal.

"These services are considered to be priority

services within Public Realm, and in this regard they are the first tasks to be assigned to staff each day," the council said.

"What this means in effect is that where a regular operative is not available on a given day a replacement is assigned to their task as a priority, before any other tasks are assigned."

The total provision for running all of these services in the revenue budget is between €8m and €9m per year.

While all reported and detected incidents of littering and illegal dumping are investigated, it is found that less and less evidence is found, meaning action cannot be taken.

"Increasingly it is found that no personal information relating to polluters is contained within the dumped material, with personal information having been removed or shredded," the council said.

With this, the local authority is encouraging assistance and support from residents "in their investigations of such incidents as they arise".

"In the absence of substantive evidence / witness statements and the presence of such witnesses in court it is not possible for us to bring successful prosecutions," it said.

Katie plays a key role in helping Ireland darts team to gold medal

19-year-old Katie Sheldon secures gold at World Darts Federation World Cup

TALLAGHT'S Katie Sheldon was on point as she played a pivotal part in helping Ireland to a first ever gold medal at the World Darts Federation (WDF) World Cup in Esbjerg, Denmark.

Battling alongside 40 teams from all around the world, the Irish team consisting of Katie Sheldon, captain Robyn Byrne, Caroline Breen, and Aoife McCormack, came out on top after eight excellent matches.

19-year-old Sheldon has added another global gold medal to her collection, having been crowned World Masters Under 18 Champion back in 2019.

"It was absolutely amazing to win the World Cup, it's what we work so hard for travelling around the country qualifying for your team so to come home with gold is just fantastic,"

Sheldon said.

"Coming home with a gold medal is what every sports person dreams of when they are going away for their selected sport so to have won one is something I'll cherish.

"It was a very special day and there was definitely some tears of joy shared.

"I couldn't ask for a better bunch of ladies to have won this with, we all played our part. We went as a team and we won as a team."

On their way to the decider, Ireland bettered Norway, France, Mongolia, and Luxembourg to the top their group and set up a tantalising clash with

tournament favourites Netherlands in the Last 16.

It was a tight game, but the Irish women came out on top on a scoreline of 9/7 to progress into the quarter final against a strong Australian team.

A 9/6 win against the team from Oz and victory over Sweden in the

penultimate round put them into the final, where Ireland recoded a brilliant 9/7 triumph against a very strong Wales outfit.

Managed by Kevin Devaney from Galway, the victory marks the first time that an Irish team won a gold medal at a Women's World Cup event.





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Food bank secures new storage spaces at Firhouse CC grounds

'People shouldn't need food banks in this day and age – we're a very rich country'

THE Ballycullen Food Bank has secured a new storage space in the grounds of Firhouse Community College, which officially began being used last Monday.

Representatives from the food bank and staff from Amazon Web Services (AWS), which helped to kit out the storage units, were on hand on the day.

The voluntary service has struggled with a lack of storage space for donated goods in recent months, as requests for help continue to spiral.

One of the volunteers from the food bank, Sue Ralph, told *The Echo*: "It's getting out of control, the number of people coming to the food bank.

"With social welfare payments being cut left, right and centre, people are struggling.

"There are also people who are still working, but they've fallen behind with their mortgage and bills going up and they can't cope – there's no help for anybody who actually works.

"You go out and earn a hard day's living and you still might not be able to afford to live."

The Ballycullen Food Bank provides a monthly service where they supply groceries for upwards of 120 people, who make contact with them through their Facebook page and get an appointment.

At the appointment, they'll get to meet one of the service's four volunteers, Tracy Griffin, Roisín Cosgrove, Paula Murray or Sue Ralph, and will collect their groceries confidentially.

The service has been supported by Knocklyon United Football Club who provide some storage space for it, but the food bank has felt the strain of having limited storage space.

It is hoped that this will now be alleviated by the new spaces in Firhouse CC, which have been kitted out with fridges, freezers and shelving.

"It's great, because there was a time when we had a massive influx of donations and sometimes we've to turn them away, but we hate turning down stuff because we have no room for it," said Sue.

"We approached Firhouse Community College because we knew the Educate Together school was there for a couple of years, but now those units are empty.

"So we just broached the subject with them, and my son goes to school there and we supply some of the families there, so we have that link."

The school happily supported the food bank, while AWS helped to get the spaces into good working order for the service.

There has been no reduction in demand for the services of the Ballycullen Food Bank since it was set up in 2020, and Sue believes that requests for help will continue to increase.

"We shouldn't need food banks," said Sue. "If we were running a business, we'd be multi-millionaires because we're growing exponentially.

"We want it to decline, but I don't think that's going to happen – I think we'll keep going because people keep needing us.

"People shouldn't need food banks in this day and age. We're a very rich country, but it's not given out fairly."

Requests for assistance can be made by contacting Ballycullen Food Bank on Facebook, while donations can be left into the Park Community Centre from Monday to Saturday every week.

Fire Brigade respond to 7,759 incidents in six months

85 new firefighters are being recruited to the force following extensive campaign

DUBLIN Fire Brigade responded to over 7,750 incidents in the first half of the year with 85 new firefighters being recruited to the force.

Following an extensive recruitment campaign earlier in 2023, a panel of 216 potential firefighters was created with two classes getting underway.

At the recent meeting of South Dublin County Council, in response to a question posed by Cllr Charlie O'Connor, the local authority gave a

rundown of the Dublin Fire Brigade services.

“The first class of 37 recruit firefighters from this panel passed out in September and a second class of 48 recruits will commence training in late October,” the council said.

More recruits are expected to commence training in 2024 with classes already budgeted for firefighters and Emergency Service Controllers, according to the local authority.

A recruitment campaign for Emergency Service Controllers (ESC)

was also advertised for earlier this year, with ESCs expected to be deployed into the East Region Communications Centre.

“A panel of 52 ESC’s was subsequently created,” the council said.

“The first class commenced in early September with the second class due to commence in late October 2023.

“Discussions on required manning levels into the future are ongoing between management and unions.”

While these recruitment campaigns were ongoing, members of Dublin

Fire Brigade (DFB) responded to a total of 7,759 incidents.

Of that, a minimum of one DFB resource was deployed, with the ambulance responding to 6,875 and firefighters responding to 884.

In giving a detailed overview of those 884 fire services incident types, small fires were the most common with 254, following by 229 alarm related incidents.

After that, car related incidences were the most common at 85 incidents.

DFB deployed special services to

respond to 22 road traffic incidents and made 10 scenes safe while one oil spill was responded to, six water leaks, three gas leaks and there were six animal rescues.

There was a grand total of 10,955 appliance mobilisations, with fire service mobilising 2,014 times and ambulance service mobilising 8,941 times.

“DFB are committed to ensuring that the Councils and residents alike will remain proud of their Fire & Ambulance service,” the council concluded.

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Residents 'serious concerns' over 136 rapid build homes

Concerns raised over strain on school places/childcare services and long term future of site

WORK is taking place for the construction of 136 rapid build homes in Lucan amid concerns about the strain on school places/childcare services in the area, and the long term future of a housing site, located on agricultural lands, reports Maurice Garvey.

The development is part of the Irish government's Rapid Build Housing Programme for Ukrainians, and the build of 700 homes at a number of sites across the country.

The provision of accommodation for Ukrainians was given exemption from the requirement to obtain planning permissions earlier this year.

This particular modular site is located on the Old Celbridge Road, west of Adamstown and scheduled for completion in early 2024.

Leaflet drops were made by the government to houses in the vicinity of the development on Tubber Lane and the Hallwell Estate, ahead of an "information session" in Adamstown Youth and Community Centre on Tuesday night.

The leaflet states that the 136 units will house 544 people and the site will be delivered in 2024.

It says the units have a life span of 60 years.

The Office of Public Works (OPW) were asked to develop the rapid build programme on behalf of the Dept Children.

Cllr Paul Gogarty (Ind), who

posted a report of the works on his website, says as the homes are two-bed, they are "not necessarily suitable for accommodating growing families long term and is probably best used for emergency accommodation - the question is where."

The site which is zoned agricultural, and *The Echo* understands it is owned by the Dept of Agriculture.

Cllr Liona O'Toole (Ind) says residents have "huge concerns" about what will happen to site in three years - a temporary time period allocated

for similar sites - noting that councillors would need to adopt a rezoning in the County Development Plan.

"I am not in favour of rezoning agricultural land," said Cllr O'Toole.

O'Toole said councillors were given short notice about a presentation of the site in June, and that "people have to have information about it."

Cllr Gogarty would have "serious concerns" about "any type of permanent housing" at the site, and that any long term housing "needs proper facilities and infrastructure and

should be dealt with as part of a Strategic Development Zone-type plan."

Councillors were told Tuath Housing will manage the site.

In the information leaflet, it says the site will have no impact on social housing as Ukrainian Beneficiaries of Temporary Protection (BTOP's) do not have rights to social housing and will be required to pay charges.

The Echo asked the Dept of Children what are the charges, and they said BTOPs will be required to make a "contribution payment for

living in the units, and includes a utility charge to cover electricity, internet, waste disposal, etc., that will be provided in all units."

The Echo also asked the Dept what "alternative arrangements" will be made to bring occupant children to schools, where the nearest schools are already full.

A Dept of Children spokesperson said: "From the outset of the war, the Department of Education established Regional Education and Language Teams (REALT) to support BOTP families in securing school places for their children. In all cases, the REALT co-ordinators have access to data that helps them identify capacity across all schools in an area. They continue to work closely with the Department of Education and stakeholders including management bodies to help ensure that BOTP children can access a school place as quickly as possible. Where families are relocated to units as part of the rapid build programme, the Department of Education will continue to work closely with REALTs and DCEDIY to help them remain in the schools where they are currently enrolled where possible. Where this is not possible, the REALTs will continue to support and work with parents and schools to help children access a place in school for the 2023/2024 school year as quickly as possible."

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Men caught in possession of €2.3m worth of cannabis get seven years

TWO men caught unloading over €2.3 million worth of cannabis in a consignment of frozen chicken have been jailed for seven years, reports Jessica Magee and David O'Sullivan.

Daniel Bowker (40) of Empire Rd, Bolton, United Kingdom and Ibrar Sharif (47) with an address at The Belfry, Kilmainham, were arrested in Dublin three days before Christmas last year.

They were both sentenced on Monday at Dublin Circuit Criminal Court.

In her sentence, Judge Orla Crowe said "the impact of drugs upon society is well known" but that the men had "put their time to good use" since being arrested.

The sentence was backdated to their arrest last December and Judge Crowe suspended the final year of the eight-year term on the condition that both be under probation supervision for two years upon release.

The two men told gardai they had been trying to gather some money to buy presents for their families.

Both men came forward on signed pleas from the District Court of possessing €2.364 million worth of cannabis for sale or supply at Kilmainham, Dublin 8 on 22 December, 2022.

They have been in custody in Cloverhill Prison since their arrest.

Detective Garda Patrick Hearne told

Diarmuid Collins BL, prosecuting, that a surveillance operation was put in place after gardai received confidential information concerning an expected delivery of pallets of illegal drugs.

At 9am on the day in question, gardai observed a white Ford Transit van driven by Bowker arriving at a unit in the Chapelizod Industrial Estate.

Both of the accused got out of the van and about an hour later, interacted with the driver of a transport truck that arrived.

Bowker was seen driving the van closer to the shutters of the unit, before the van left in convoy with another car.

The van was driven to a house in the Kilmainham area where Sharif directed it into a driveway and both men began to unload cardboard boxes from the van into the house.

The van was driven off and then stopped by gardai, whereupon two men tried to flee before they were arrested.

Gardai got a search warrant for the house in Kilmainham and seized 12 cardboard boxes containing a total of 119 kilos of vacuum-packed cannabis.

Bowker admitted putting boxes into the van and driving them to the Kilmainham address but initially told gardai he didn't know what was in the boxes.

During subsequent interviews, he admitted

that there were bags of cannabis underneath frozen chicken and that himself and Sharif had taken the drugs out and put them into new boxes.

Bowker has five previous convictions from the UK for minor offences including criminal damage.

Det Garda Hearne agreed with counsel for the defence that both Bowker and Sharif had been cooperative with gardai and both had long-standing alcohol problems.

The garda also agreed that both accused were at the lower end of the ladder of the organised crime gang and had been used by those higher up to courier drugs.

It was also agreed that neither man displayed any signs of wealth or a lavish lifestyle, nor did they stand to benefit materially from the crime.

Defence counsel for Bowker said he was suffering from severe anxiety, depression and PTSD after he was assaulted in January 2022 by three men who broke into his house to try and steal a dog.

The court heard Bowker suffered a facial fracture and had to get two plates inserted into his jaw in the attack.

Bowker told gardai he was a heavy drinker, on medication for anxiety and depression and had wanted to make some "quick money" to buy Christmas presents for his three kids.

Bowker wrote a letter of explanation and remorse and said he had been "very naive".

Letters were also presented from Bowker's former wife describing him as a caring, sensitive person when sober.

Another letter from Bowker's housing manager describes him as "a lovable man and a model tenant" with "a big heart but a tortured soul".

Maurice Coffey SC, defending Sharif, said his client had similarly found himself vulnerable, broke and with a drinking problem coming up to last Christmas.

Mr Coffey said Sharif began working at the age of nine in markets and later worked in restaurants, factories and Marks & Spencer's until he was made redundant during Covid.

"He had no money, he was unemployed, he foolishly agreed to get involved and let his moral compass shift," said counsel.

Defence counsel said that organised crime gangs often prey on people who have dependency problems and no money, cajoling them to do their dirty work and suffer the punishment while those at the top are protected from the law.

A letter from Sharif spoke of his remorse, regret and hopes for the future. Letters were also presented from his sisters describing his good heart and hardworking ethos.

Suspended sentence for woman who forged 51 prescriptions

Accused admitted to gardai that she was taking 20 sleeping tablets each night

A WOMAN with an addiction to sleeping tablets has been given a one-year suspended sentence for forging prescriptions, reports Eimear Dodd and David O'Sullivan.

Lynsey Ryan (39) pleaded guilty at Dublin Circuit Criminal Court to 51 counts of forging prescriptions at five pharmacies in west Dublin over a two-year period between August 2018 and August 2020.

Ryan, of Errigal Road, Drimnagh, told gardai she was taking 20 sleeping tablets each night and had come to rely on the tablets to help her sleep.

Sentencing Ryan on Tuesday, Judge Orla Crowe said she "has an addiction that she is dealing with" and that "her personal circumstances were very difficult".

Judge Crowe took into consideration Ryan always paid for the tablets, but she said that was "not to condone in any way what happened". She handed down a sentence of one year and suspended it on a number of conditions.

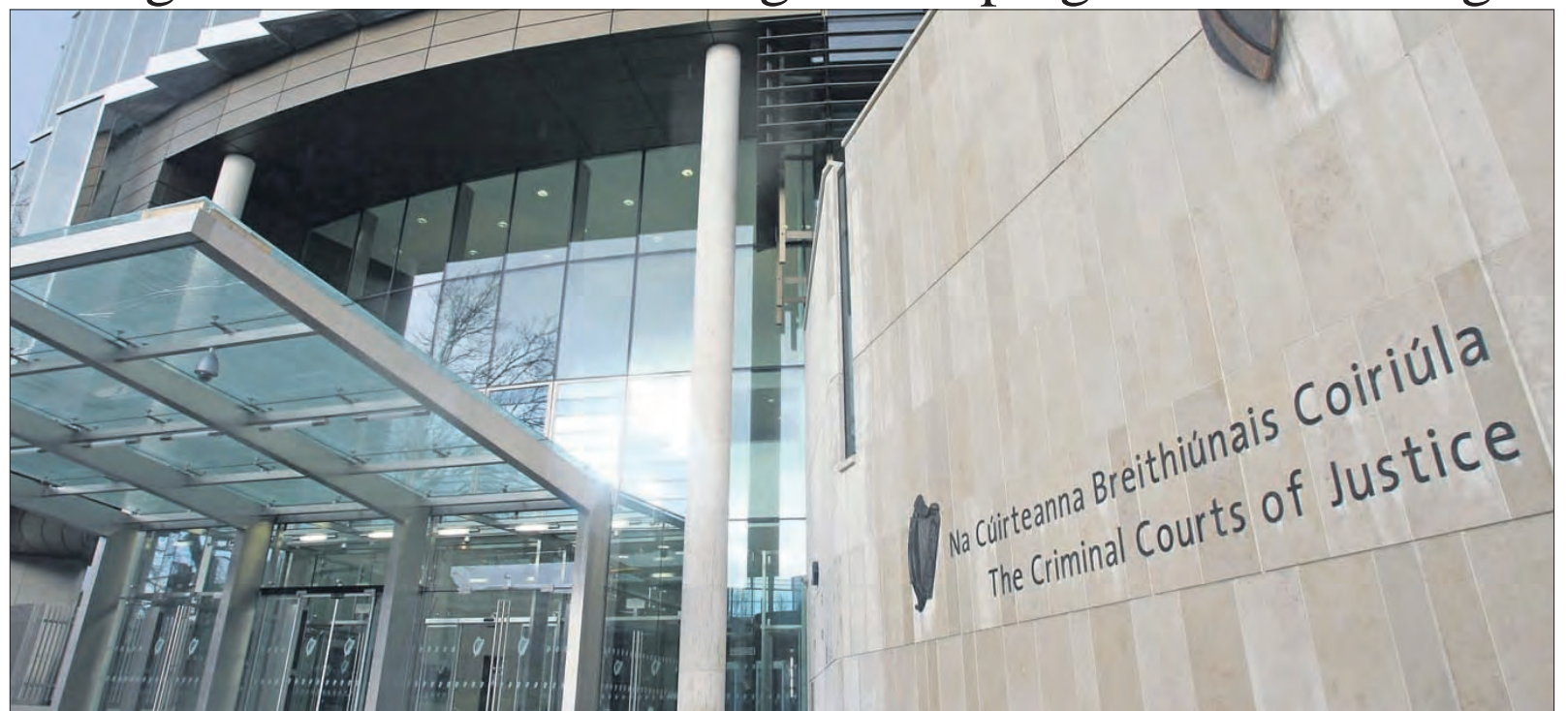
As part of her sentence, Ryan is to engage with employment services.

She must also undergo urine analysis and if drugs are detected, the case may be reintroduced to the court.

Ryan has 159 previous district court convictions, including 67 for using a false instrument.

Garda Dylan McGrath previously gave evidence that gardai were contacted by staff at Maher's Pharmacy, Churchtown after a woman visited the pharmacy with a forged prescription for sleeping tablets.

The pharmacist became suspicious and contacted the doctor named on the



prescription, who said it was a forgery.

Gardai also spoke to the doctor, who confirmed that it was not his signature on the prescription and he did not know the patient name.

A forged prescription alert was later issued by the HSE, which led to reports of forged prescriptions from four other pharmacies.

Gardai obtained CCTV from each of the pharmacies.

There were 12 incidents at Lloyds

Pharmacy Tallaght and 36 incidents at McCabe's Pharmacy Tallaght.

Three further incidents occurred at three other pharmacies, including Maher's Pharmacy.

In each case, a woman using a fictitious name "Aisling Dunne" handed over a prescription for sleeping tablets.

Gardai made contact with the defendant, and Ryan was arrested on March 27, 2021.

She made full admissions during interview and expressed her remorse.

Garda McGrath agreed with defence counsel that Ryan had a copy of headed paper, which she would photocopy, cut out and then write the prescription.

Ryan told gardai she did not try to get a legitimate prescription and she was ashamed of her actions, which she recognised were criminal.

Ryan said she had been addicted to

sleeping tablets for 15 years and she takes more than could be prescribed.

She also takes other medication prescribed by her GP.

Ryan said her addiction issues started following the death of two family members and she relied on the sleeping tablets to help her sleep.

A letter of apology from Ryan was handed to the court, as well as a letter from her partner.

Students get to turn that business dream into reality

Over 25,000 students from 500 schools will be setting out on an entrepreneurial journey

STUDENTS get to turn their business dreams into a reality and figure out what floats through the Social Enterprise Programme in schools across South Dublin.

This year, 115 transition year students in groups of up to five students are participating in the business development initiative at Kishoge Community College.

Over 25,000 students from around 500 second-level schools nationwide will be embarking on their entrepreneurial journey as they create, establish, and run their own businesses.

The top business get to go forward and compete for the top prize of Student Enterprise of the Year, with the programme run through Local Enterprise Offices, Entrprise Ireland and local authorities.

Marie Lyons is business coordinator in Kishoge Community College and she is excited for her students to get stuck into the Student Enterprise Programme once again.

“This is something we have done in Kishoge Community College for the past few years and the support is great,” Ms Lyons tells *The Echo*.

“The Local Enterprise Office connects us with people who have experience running a business, so students get to listen to people who have real-life experience and it’s not just us harping on.

“A lot of our students have great ideas for businesses in the future and want to be entrepreneurs when they get older, like Bill Gates or Elon Musk, but they really don’t know where to start.”

In Kishoge, they break the Student Enterprise Programme down into different sections starting with an idea generation session and business plan development session.

From that point on, students get to pitch their ideas and apply for a nominal loan from the school, to get experience of achieving funding for their businesses before floating it at an internal winter fair.

What the school has found is that its students get a tremendous amount of practical ideation, marketing, finance and sales experience along the way.

“It’s all about application,” Ms Lyons details.

“Our students hear a lot about business and how it’s done, but the reality is that you won’t know until you sit down and figure out how to run one, discover what is successful and what isn’t.

“It is an opportunity for our students to understand business more when going into the Leaving Certificate, and all of the aspects of how to run one and what it takes to do it successfully.

“What we have found is that our students usually list the programme and their business journey as one of their highlights of the year.”

Students from first to sixth year can participate in the Student Enterprise Programme across Junior, Intermediate and Senior categories.

Schools across the county are encouraged to sign-up and participate in the initiative, with some 325,000 students doing so since it began in 2003.

Over 1,700 social and affordable homes in the pipeline for delivery

Plans are also progressing to bring forward planning applications for 1,400 homes

OVER 1,700 new social and affordable homes on lands owned by South Dublin County Council are on site or in the pipeline for delivery.

In the quarterly progress report on the local authority's capital projects, it gave an overview of progress under its Housing Deliver Action Plan (HDAP) 2022 – 2026.

According to the council, over 500 social and affordable homes have been delivered to date under the HDAP with 1,000 on track for delivery this year through Part V, Approved Housing Bodies and leasing.

Plans are progressing to bring forward planning applications for 1,400 homes in the Clonburris Strategic Development Zone (SDZ) phases three to five, and it is expecting to get a planning exemption to progress plans for 365 homes by the end of 2024.

"Over 1,700 new social and affordable homes on Council lands . . . are either currently under construction or with planning permission in place," the report said.

There are five primary large-scale housing projects outlined in the report by the council – Clonburris SDZ, Kilcarbery, Belgard Square North, Killinarden Foothills and Rathcoole.

Phase three works to deliver 103 social and 29 affordable homes at Kilcarbery have recently commenced with a projected completion for 2023.

Design work is also progressing for 88 additional homes in Kilcarbery, and is set to utilise a temporary Part 8 planning exemption.

Belgard Square North, which comprises of 133 cost-rental apartments and is scheduled for delivery in early 2025, will be the first standalone local authority cost-rental development in Ireland.

There is planning permission in place for 635 social, affordable and private homes in the Killinarden Foothills, with the council working with "joint venture partners to finalise agreement to see commencement on site".

A presentation in the Killinarden development will be given to councillors with updated cost projects and a potential revision of the tenure mix to incorporate cost-rental homes in place of private units.

Meanwhile, consultants have been engaged to progress design work for the Rathcoole masterplan, which will incorporate housing, a school and sports facilities.

There are sections and phases of the Clonburris SDZ, most of which are earmarked for completion by summer 2024.

Under approved social housing developments, tenancies are expected to commence at St Mark's and Templeogue village with 379 units across 12 different developments

either on site or in the tender phase.

Age-friendly homes at Old Bawn, Maplewood, Fernwood, and Riversdale are on site with a completion date targeting before Christmas.

On track also are 93 units at New Nangor Road, 19 at Lindsifarne and 69 in Balgaddy for completion in the first half of 2024 with a new contractor on site at Homeville, targeting completion by quarter three next year.

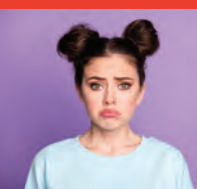
Construction tenders have commenced this month for the age-friendly developments at St Aongus, St Ronan's and Pearse Brothers Park, with a projected completion date of this time next year.

There are 10 development sites consisting of a total of 365 units, which have received temporary planning exemptions with proposed tenures of social, affordable and traveller accommodation.

All of these sites with temporary planning exemptions – Rossfield, Owendoher Haven, Deansrath/Melrose, Alpine Heights, Sarsfield Park, Stocking Lane, Castlefield, Oldcastle Park, Kilcarbery and Kishogue Park – are expected to commence construction at sometime in 2024.

"These sites are required to commence no later than the end of 2024 to avail of the temporary derogation," the council said.

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Pool works unlikely to finish by year end

Contractor unable to increase resources on swimming pool site

THE latest delay in the opening of Lucan Swimming Pool is the “least surprising announcement of the year”, according to Cllr Paul Gogarty (Ind).

The pool had been scheduled to open at the end of October, but works are not yet completed, and unlikely to be finished by the end of this year.

Lucan has been waiting for decades for a swimming pool and it is a running joke on local social media sites.

In a briefing to councillors this week, South Dublin County Council said “the contractor has been unable to “either increase the resources on site to a sufficient level or to effectively coordinate the work from sub-contractors to meet the key deliverables and dependencies to be in a position to complete the project by the end of this month as they had projected.”

“This has had a knock-on effect on the timing of the connection of utilities to the site and, more

significantly, delayed the ordering of the moveable floor for the secondary pool.”

The council say it is their intention to pursue “appropriate remedies available under the building contract for any unjustified delays over and above the previously submitted programme.”

The have been advised by the

contractor that the lead-in time for the moveable floor to be delivered and installed can be up to 12 weeks.

The council and their selected facility partners, Aura Leisure, will arrange an information session for local councillors next month.

Cllr Paul Gogarty said the project is a continuation of “multiple delays that SDCC has

described as ‘embarrassing.’

“However no meaningful action ever appears to have been taken to make anyone accountable. There are very few works remaining, but the pace has been slower than a sloth crossing a road. As such, it’s now highly unlikely the pool will be open before 2024,” said Gogarty.

Once-off budget measures will keep heads above water

BUDGET 2024 included a raft of measures including the €2.7bn cost-of-living package, to combat crippling energy prices over winter.

Minister for Finance Michael McGrath and Minister for Public Expenditure Paschal Donohoe outlined the Budget in full in the Dáil.

Minister Donohoe said all households will receive a further set of credits to help with energy bills over the winter.

Three credits of €150 each will be provided between the end of this year and April of next year.

The minister also said a €300 lump sum payment will be made to recipients of the Fuel Allowance in the last quarter of this year, while an additional €200 will also be paid this year to recipients of the Living Alone Allowance.

Two multi-billion euro funds are to be established to futureproof the economy, fund infrastructure and climate projects.

The social welfare package of €2.3bn is also a huge increase. Yet many benefits - like Christmas bonuses and double payments - are once-offs.

Minister Donohoe said that Budget 2024 has provided for a total allocation of €22.5 billion for the public health system.

There are almost 900,000 people on some form of waiting list, most of these waiting for an outpatient appointment.

Overall, Budget 2024 increased core spending by around the rate of inflation.

There are lots of once-off measures that will help keep heads above water for another winter but how long will it last.

€14bn budget sees increases in social welfare and three €150 energy credits

A €4 billion Budget spend was announced on Tuesday, with three €150 energy credits, increases in social welfare and further reductions in childcare costs among the measures.

There is also targeted relief for mortgage holders and an increase in the national minimum wage to €12.70 per hour, an increase of €1.40.

Speaking in the Dáil on Tuesday afternoon, Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform, Paschal Donohoe TD said that recent Budgets responded to Brexit, a pandemic, the war in Ukraine and now, to the rising cost of living.

He said he is “conscious” that many people are concerned about rising costs and particularly the challenges of heating and lighting their homes this winter.

Minister Donohoe said that all households will receive a further set of credits to assist with energy bills – alongside a number of once-off payments to help with rising living costs.

Winter / once-off cost of living supports

- Three credits of €150 will be provided between the end of 2023 and April of next year.
- €300 Fuel Allowance lump sum
- €200 Living Alone Allowance lump sum
- A double payment of Child Payment, worth an additional €140 for each child, will be made to all qualifying households before Christmas.
- A once-off €400 payment for people on the Working Family Payment this year.
- €100 Working Family lump sum this year.
- Double week for all weekly welfare schemes (January 2024)
- €400 lump sum to selected welfare categories: Carer’s Allowance, Disability Allowance etc.
- A double payment of the Foster Care allowance



Tax

- Increase of €1,500 in the income tax standard rate cut-off point for all earners
- €200 increase in the Incapacitated Child Tax Credit
- €100 increase in the personal tax credit
- €100 increase in the PAYE tax credit
- €100 increase in the Earned Income Credit
- €100 increase the Home Carer Tax Credit
- €100 increase in the Single Person Child Carer Credit
- A reduction in the middle rate of Universal Social Charge (USC) from 4.5% to 4%
- Increase in the Rent Tax Credit from €500 to €750.
- 75c Increase in Excise Duty and VAT on a pack of 20 cigarettes
- Extension of VRT relief for Battery Electric Vehicles to the end of December 2025.

Health

- Extension of Child Benefit to pupils over 18 years in full time education

- A further 25 per cent reduction in the cost of childcare from September 2024.

- Help-To-Buy scheme extended to end of 2025. Scheme is being amended so that applicants of the local authority affordable purchase scheme can avail of Help-To-Buy. Changes will take effect from tomorrow.

Man fined €500 and costs for tampering with gas meter

Gas Networks Safety Manager says: ‘Anyone who interferes with a gas meter is risking their life’

A TALLAGHT man was recently fined €500 for tampering with a gas meter, and has to pay a further €500 to Gas Networks Ireland.

Last week on Monday, October 2, Connor Mulligan, of Mac Uilliam Avenue apartments in Tallaght, pleaded guilty in Dublin District Court to the dishonest use of gas.

The court heard that Gas Networks Ireland had carried out an investigation at the property in February 2023 and found the gas supply had been unlawfully tampered.

Judge Anthony Halpin convicted and fined Mr Mulligan €500 on the offence of dishonest use of gas contrary to Section 15(2) of the

Energy (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1995 as amended.

Two further offences under sections 15 (3) and 15 (6) were also taken into consideration, and costs of €500 were also allocated to Gas Networks Ireland.

Mr Mulligan has been given three months to discharge the total sum of €1,000.

Gas Networks Ireland’s Networks Safety Manager, Owen Wilson, said: “This verdict sends out an important message to the public that meter-tampering is a serious crime with potentially deadly consequences.

“Theft of gas is a very serious issue, but far more serious is the risk to life that meter-tampering poses to the perpetrator and to people nearby.

“We are working to end unlawful interference with gas meters and the dangers associated with this activity.”

Due to the dangers involved, gas meter tampering is a criminal offence with possible fines of up to €5,000 and prison sentences of up to six months for those found

guilty of the crime.

Gas Networks Ireland has been actively engaged in identifying and making safe installations where tampering has been found and has detected over 2,900 cases of meter-tampering across the country since 2013.

By law, only Gas Networks Ireland representatives and registered gas installers are authorised to work on natural gas meters and pipework.

It is illegal to ask, pay or allow someone else to tamper with a gas meter.

Mr Wilson added: “Rogue contractors can make seemingly attractive offers, but the dangers involved in allowing someone who is not registered and qualified to do the work, are very real.

“Anyone who either interferes with a gas meter themselves or agrees to allow someone who is not a registered gas installer to work on their gas installations is risking their own life, those of their family, and of people living nearby.”

Members of the public are asked to report any suspicions of gas meter tampering to Gas Networks Ireland in strict confidence by calling 1800 464 464.

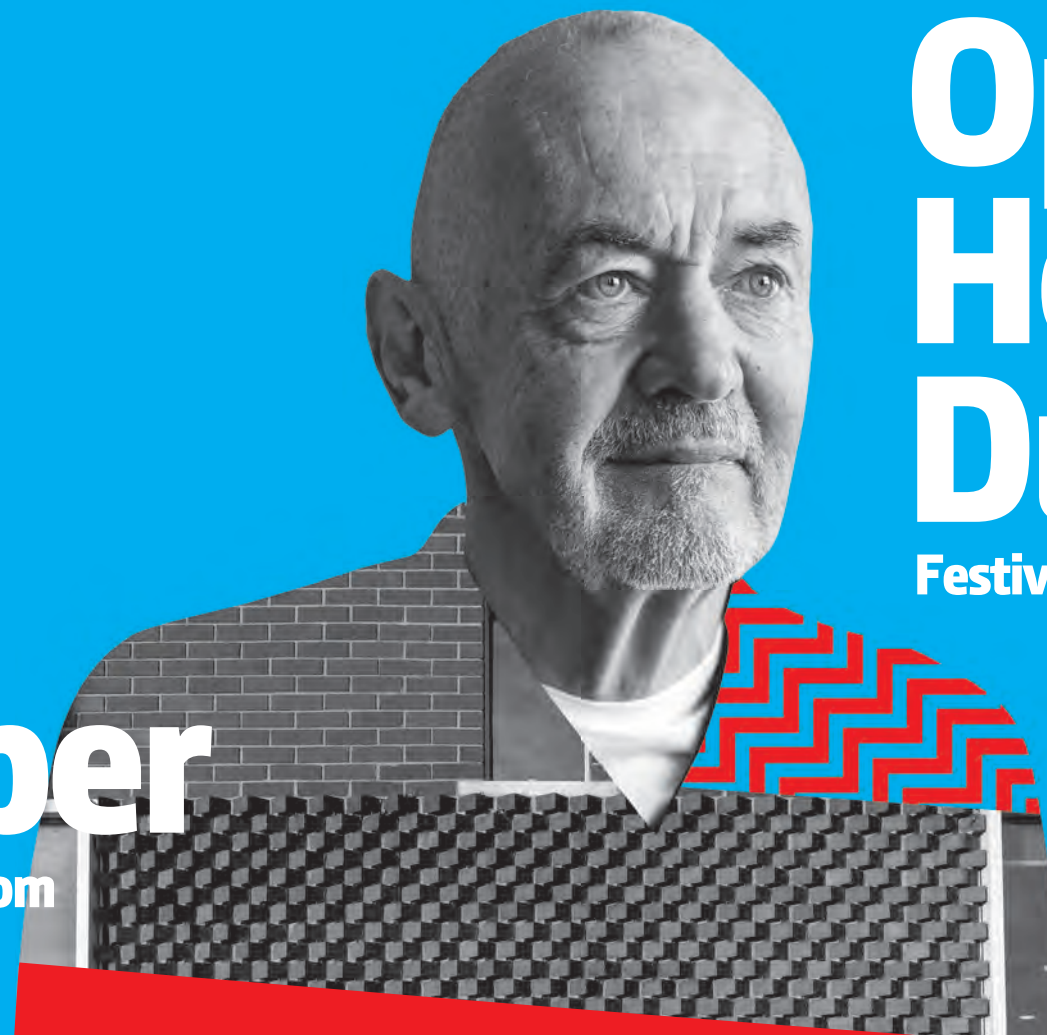

Major plans for Speaker Conolly pub



If permission is granted, construction of an 85-unit apartment block will proceed

A PLANNING application for the demolition of the Speaker Conolly pub in Firhouse and the construction of an 85-unit apartment block has been submitted to South Dublin County Council, reports Aideen O'Flaherty.

The proposal by Seabren Developments Limited, which is led by Michael Moran of Moran's Red Cow Hotel, includes the demolition of the Speaker and the construction of a five- to six-storey block.

The block will house 36 one-bed apartments, 48 two-bed apartments, and one studio apartment.

The development will also consist of non-residential uses at ground-floor level, including a public house, a restaurant, a health care unit, a café and two micro-enterprise units.

A decision on the application is due from the council by November 20.

As reported in *The Echo* last month, a deal was struck for the pub, with a local developer acquiring the property for an estimated €3.5m,

subject to securing planning approval for apartments and a pub among other uses.

The Moran family, synonymous with the Red Cow Inn and Red Cow Moran Hotel, reached an agreement with the Murphy family for the purchase of the Speaker Conolly.

Should South Dublin County Council give the green light for the proposed development, the purchase will be finalised, having been legally agreed between the Moran and Murphy families.

If permission be granted, the acquisition will be completed, and the tendering process will begin, with construction expected to commence shortly thereafter.

It is understood that the plan is to maintain the full operation of the Speaker Conolly during the construction phase.

In the meantime, while the proposal goes through the planning process with the local authority, the Moran family will operate the Speaker Conolly on a lease agreement.

The Moran family took over the reins at the

end of July and have conducted a soft refurbishment, with a new kitchen in order to hopefully start providing food again in the next few weeks.

Core staff remain in the Speaker Conolly, with senior management coming across from the Red Cow in recent months to run the business.

Named after William 'Speaker' Conolly of Hellfire Club fame, the pub was built for two Tallaght publicans, James Murphy (The Dragon Inn) and Harry Morton (The Firhouse Inn) in 1985.

Costing an estimated €600,000, local builder John McDermott developed the new pub for the two publicans, and it served its first pint in July of that year.

A few years ago, the Murphy family acquired the majority stake in the pub and recently agreed the deal with the Moran Group, which is run by the six Moran siblings and their mother Sheila Moran.

"The Murphys are long-term family friends,"

Michael Moran told *The Echo* last month.

"The Murphy's are in a similar transition as ourselves – the family business went from the parents to the siblings and their desire was not to continue in the bar business.

"Our desire was to grow our business and we felt we could do a slightly convoluted deal that gave everybody their desired outcome.

"We all trusted each other to go on a bit of a journey there that we got to in the end.

"We're from Rathfarnham ourselves, we've spent all our life working in Clondalkin and The Speaker is basically halfway between the two, it's in our catchment area.

"We do see a great opportunity there to take what is a 1980's building, bring it up to 2025 standard, modernise the offering on the ground floor and provide much-needed accommodation on the upper floors because, as we all know, there's a housing crisis.

"It fits us because we are in hospitality and the development business."

Resounding 'yes' to maximum discount on Local Property Tax

Main criticism of 'unfair' tax is that it does not take home circumstances into consideration

COUNCILLORS in South Dublin County Council voted to retain the maximum discount allowable for Local Property Tax (LPT) in 2024.

At the monthly meeting on Monday, councillors voted by 27 votes to seven, with one abstention, to apply the maximum 15 per cent discount.

The 15 per cent reduction to LPT, was also passed by the members in SDCC 12 months ago, but this period was up at the end of October 2023, and needed a new vote on whether to allow a 5 per cent, 10 per cent or 15 per cent reduction.

According to an LPT report by the council, 100 per cent of the €32.2m in LPT taxes in 2023 was retained locally unlike previous years when "20 per cent was paid into an equalisation fund to

ensure no local authority was worse off from local retention of LPT in 2023 compared to General Purpose Grant allocations in 2014."

At the meeting, councillors main criticism of the "unfair tax" is that it does not take into consideration financial circumstances of the home.

Cllr Madeleine Johansson (PBP) voted in favour of the reduction, citing the cost of living crisis, and her opposition to property tax "from the very beginning."

"The tax burden should not disproportionately fall on the shoulders of our residents, especially when it is not directly tied to their financial capacities," said Johansson, who reiterated her support to see a "real wealth tax to tackle inequality."

Cllr Ronan McMahon (Ind) said the "unfair tax" does not "take into account income in the home."

"There has been a huge increase in mortgage payments. I'd suggest you prioritise collecting the €8.2m owed in rents, which can be used for services," said McMahon.

Cllr Paul Gogarty (Ind) said the tax is impacting people and that the council have potential to chase millions in derelict housing and rebates on vacant commercial sites.

"Let's focus on people who have the money, and not those that don't," said Gogarty.

'Not possible' to attend local bus forums – transport CEO

National Transport Authority supremo says they would be happy to meet at council meetings

DESPITE pleas for the National Transport Authority (NTA) to attend local bus forums in Tallaght and Lucan to discuss resident concerns on

transport issues, this is not possible due to the scale of requests nationwide, according to CEO of the NTA, Anne Graham.

Speaking at the monthly council meeting during a presentation of the NTA's public transport update, Ms Graham said: "We have been asked to

numerous area meetings around the country but we would find it very difficult to serve every area meeting."

Ms Graham said their preference would be to meet at council meetings and that they are also happy to meet representatives outside of council meetings.

Tallaght Cllrs Kieran Mahon (Sol) and Mick Duff (Lab) were among those who asked the NTA to take up an offer to attend Tallaght area meetings and meet the local transport forum, in particular in relation to many "unique problems in Tallaght."

Lucan featured heavily among the questions, with the loss of the 25 route following BusConnects among the main concerns for residents in the area.

Councillors also raised the frequency of bus no-shows in Lucan, leaving residents stranded at bus stops, questioning how driver recruitment is being addressed.

Cllr Paul Gogarty (Ind) said anytime services are rolled out, it seems to affect other routes, and asked if the NTA should pause BusConnects until bus operators can address the recruitment issue for drivers.

"There needs to be a 25 route and specific need to address bus users in Adamstown and Dodsboro. Driver no-shows – is any scope for increasing fines for the company," said Gogarty.

Cllr Derren Ó Brádaigh (SF) said there was a "general grievance" at the loss of the 25 for residents in Dodsboro, Hillcrest, Woodview, and

that community meetings have been attended by up to 150 people.

Cllr Liona O'Toole (Ind) noted that the growth of Adamstown is "not able to cope with demand" while Cllr Joanna Tuffy (Lab) feels the Luas to Lucan village is "vital" in terms of the "huge investment" going into the village, including plans for tourism links.

With regard to driver recruitment, Ms Graham said funding is not an issue, they put drivers down as essential workers "so operators can apply outside the EU."

As for BusConnects, Ms Graham said the idea is to try and improve the services and that they have seen a good response from people travelling on the C Spine.

A YOUNG woman who was diagnosed with heart failure just days after giving birth to her first child is now hoping to raise awareness of postnatal heart failure to prevent other women from ignoring the signs.

Clondalkin woman Emma Connors, 35, had a largely healthy pregnancy during which she managed a diagnosis of gestational diabetes, and gave birth to her and her partner Chris's son, JJ, in 2021.

Shortly after he was born, JJ was admitted to hospital with jaundice, and after he was allowed to go home Emma noticed something wasn't quite right with her.

Her legs had doubled in size, and she began to experience breathlessness and decided to go to hospital as her condition continued to worsen.

"I was unsure if I should go to the hospital because I thought it might be Covid, but I felt that if I didn't get to a hospital soon that, very shortly, I wouldn't be able to breathe at all," said Emma.

"My partner brought me straight to the hospital, where I really struggled to walk to the door. I stopped and leaned up against a railing to catch my breath.

“ I thought I did all the research when I was pregnant, but I didn't see anything about postnatal heart failure anywhere . . .

"When I entered the Emergency Department tent at the Mater Hospital, the triage nurse took my vitals, oxygen, blood pressure, and heart rate, all of which were alarming.

"The triage nurse immediately admitted me.

"Within 20 minutes I had a Covid-19 swab taken, a chest X-ray, and blood taken. The X-ray showed that I had fluid in my lungs which needed to be removed.

"The catheter removed over 8kgs in weight of fluid from my body over the five days I was in the hospital – I felt like a deflated balloon. I lost a further 8kg in fluid over the next few weeks."

Later that day, Dr Emer Joyce, the heart consultant in the hospital, diagnosed legal secretary Emma with postnatal heart failure.

Emma is now managing her condition well and has made some lifestyle changes, including eating more oily fish, being more physically active, and weighing herself to monitor fluid gain.

She decided to speak out about her condition as part of the Irish Heart Foundation's recently launched 'Her Heart Matters' campaign.

The initiative highlights that one in four women die from heart disease and stroke, and outlines the importance of keeping your heart healthy and paying attention to any warning signs.

"I thought I did all the research when I was pregnant, but I didn't see anything about postnatal heart failure anywhere," added Emma.


"It's so important for women to listen to their bodies. I wrote off my breathlessness so many times, but my body was drowning in fluid.

"I feel so lucky to be able to return to normal life. Your heart does matter, look after it."



Leading dietician team delivers new eLearning course for doctors on nutrition

THE Department of Nutrition and Dietetics at Tallaght University Hospital (TUH) has just launched a new eLearning course for doctors. It is called, "Nutrition Essentials for Non Consultant Hospital Doctors and Healthcare Practitioners in the Acute Care setting." This course is the first of its kind in Ireland.

The dietitians at TUH have years of experience in delivering nutrition education to doctors. They designed this module to ensure that doctors are able to identify the signs of malnutrition and the components of good nutritional care.

Many key nutritional topics are covered, including malnutrition (identification and management), re-feeding syndrome, and methods of nutrition support provision (oral, enteral and parenteral) in addition to addressing many common nutritional misconceptions. Currently, there is no

requirement for health professionals, other than dietitians, to receive education and training in nutritional care. Whilst this module is designed primarily for doctors, it is relevant to all healthcare practitioners.

The module was written by Kate Muldowney, Senior Dietitian in Critical Care (primary author) and Sinead Feehan, Dietitian Manager. The content evaluation team was comprised of members of the TUH Dietetics Department and Dr Paul Maguire, Medical Intern (currently in Saint James Hospital). The technical team comprised Tom Martin, Clodagh McLoughlin and Manon Van Alphen from the TUH Centre of Learning and Development.

The module is currently available for all health professionals to complete on the HSeLanD online platform. This project was generously supported by the Meath Foundation

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Vandalism did not deter Lemass commemoration

THE Captain Noel Lemass Centenary Commemoration was held on Military Road in the Dublin Mountains last Sunday, reports Aileen O'Flaherty.

The event organisers were undeterred from holding the event after an act of vandalism that saw a monument in his memory being daubed with red paint just hours before.

Mr Lemass, brother of then-future taoiseach Seán Lemass, was an anti-Treaty IRA captain who was

abducted in broad daylight from Wicklow Street in the city centre on July 3, 1923.

His mutilated body was discovered along Military Road on October 13, 1923, where there were apparent signs of torture on the 25-year-old's body. He was later buried in Glasnevin Cemetery.

The centenary event was marked by members of Fianna Fáil, including Tánaiste Micheál Martin, who outlined the details of Mr Lemass's gruesome death and subsequent

discovery.

Local Fianna Fáil TD John Lahart acknowledged the distress caused by the desecration of the national monument dedicated to Mr Lemass, but emphasised that the attendees remained undeterred.

He stated that everyone present was resolute in not letting this incident overshadow the importance of the occasion.

A wreath was laid at the wall that surrounds the monument to Mr Lemass, while a bagpiper played.

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The 'horrors' of navigating child disability services

A PUBLIC meeting is being organised in Tallaght for parents "dealing with the horrors of navigating children's disability services", according to local TD Paul Murphy.

The People Before Profit representative has been working with parents who have had to take High Court cases in order to receive services they believe their child should be automatically entitled to.

He has stated: "Parents are having to fight for these services which are considered basic human rights in most countries. Our Government is failing the most vulnerable in our society. We need huge investment in every area of children's disability services; from assessment of need, to financial and respite support for parents and carers, also support for staff working in the children's disability sector. These workers are underpaid and overworked."

The Ombudsman for Children recently accused the state of a "profound violation of children's rights" in the areas of mental health and disability care. Nowhere to Turn, a report released by the Ombudsman for Children's Office (OCO) described how children with complex disabilities are left in inappropriate settings for months as the government has failed to provide them adequate home supports.

The meeting will be addressed by Rachel Martin who founded FUSS (Families Unite for Services and Support) Ireland after two of her children were left in limbo. In a statement she said;

"For decades, services for our disabled and neurodivergent children/young people have been grossly underfunded and neglected. Every child deserves timely access to assessment, interventions, and appropriate educational settings. It is time for the government to be held accountable for their failures."

The meeting will be held in The Maldrón Hotel, Tallaght on Thursday, October 19, 7.30pm. Speakers will include; Rachel Martin founder of FUSS (Families Unite for Services and Support), a solicitor specialising in High Court cases against the state in relation to children's disability services and Paul Murphy TD.

Active Travel Roadshow

SADDLING up, South Dublin County Council is set to be the first local authority to run an Active Travel Roadshow after launching the first Active Travel website.

At the recent monthly meeting of South Dublin County Council, the authority detailed the steps being taken to promote the use of cycle lanes.

Active Travel is making a journey by walking, cycling or other sustainable modes and are typically short, like cycling to school or walking to the shop.

The Active Travel team is set to embark on a series of roadshows, which will be targeting the promotion of such infrastructure and modes of transport.

A pilot bike library scheme has also been launched in two primary schools on Rossmore Road, with the aim of encouraging parents and children to cycle to school safely. Should this be a success, the council intends to roll it out in more schools.

Separately, Bike Week is something that the council runs annually, delivering events such as community cycles, bike maintenance clinics, and school events.

Call-out for restoration of 'bulky waste' collections

Council says it spends around €1.4m on removal of illegally dumped items

BULKY waste collections should be reinstated by the council, according to Cllr Derren Ó Brádaigh (SF).

At the South Dublin County Council meeting this week, Cllr Ó Brádaigh asked for an estimated cost of removing discarded bulky household items.

In response, the council said it spends approximately €1.4m per year on the removal of illegally dumped materials.

These costs include "substantial wages", together with the "provision of vehicles complete with lifting equipment, fuel costs and the cost to dispose of the waste."

"In my view, bulky items such as household furniture, doors, wardrobes, beds, mattresses, etc account for a substantial percentage of the overall amount, whether in their originally dumped state or in the eventual embers of illegal burning," said Ó Brádaigh.

“Whilst there may be some **Bulky items such as household furniture, doors, wardrobes, beds, mattresses, etc, account for a substantial percentage of the overall amount...**

disagreement about the exact percentage that 'bulky waste' is responsible for within the illegally dumped figures recorded, it is nonetheless significant. The impact on our environment is a problem that still exists since this service was discontinued in 2008.

"I also support the re-municipalisation of domestic waste collection services for the simple reason, that I believe privatisation of services has been responsible for a further sizeable portion of the ongoing problem in terms of the 'black bag' dumping element," said Cllr Ó Brádaigh.

"The equated annual cost previously for providing a bulky waste service to households on a semi-annual basis was in the region of €500k to €600k. This service covered 20,000 homes at the time removing 1,500 tonnes per year, and whilst any reintroduction could be expected to have increased costs with more homes, it is worth remembering that many householders have adopted better and more responsible recycling practices in the intervening years."

A NEW parents' room was officially opened in St Anne's Primary School in Fettercairn on Thursday, and it coincided with a coffee morning that saw the school raise over €1,000 for a hospice.

The parents' room is an essential component of the St Anne's community, but it fell by the wayside during Covid-19, and when normal classes resumed, the room had to be turned into a classroom.

Because of this, the school approached the local parish and managed to secure another room on the school grounds, but in a separate building.

Over several weeks, owing to the dedication and work of school staff, parents, school caretaker Peter King, and Mary Kelly from the parish, the room was brought up to scratch and is now open.

"We had a lovely parents' room, but about four years ago people stopped going in because of Covid, and two years ago it became an ASD classroom because we had no other space," said principal Ray Lynn.

The school approached the parish about using a room on the school grounds belonging to them and received a positive response and got

to work on re-establishing the school's parents' room.

The room was in a state of disrepair when the school received it, but through hard work and donations they created a vibrant, welcoming space for parents to unwind and attend courses.

The team of volunteers cleaned out the room, painted it all, put in new lights, got an electrician to fix the wiring, and put new appliances in the room.

The room has already been in use for a year, but the official launch only occurred last week as Mr Lynn wanted to solidify the space after it became a part of the school again.

"Last year, we just wanted to get the room up and running, but this year is about getting it moving," he told *The Echo*.

The room is in use every day, with parents using it in the morning after dropping their kids off, in the afternoon while waiting for their children, and for classes on topics such as healthy eating.

Alongside the launch of the room, the school also held a coffee morning in aid of Our Lady's Hospice, Harold's Cross, which saw parent Erroll Flynn shave off his hair for the cause.

The school community raised over €1,000 for the hospice, adding to the feel-good factor on the day.

Community garden wins top Chef's Larder Award

Garden provides an avenue to participate in climate action

A COMMUNITY Garden which supplies local cafés and shops with high-quality produce has been recognised with a prestigious Chef's Larder Award at the 2023 Blas na hÉireann Awards.

Cherry Orchard Community Garden, a local climate-action social enterprise managed by Ballyfermot Chapelzod Partnership and supported by Dublin City Council, was rewarded at the awards last Friday.

The prestigious Chef's Larder Award was given for the garden's mixed salads which it grows and provides to local cafés and shops at the 2023 Blas na hÉireann Awards.

The garden plays an important role in Cherry Orchard by providing an amenity for residents and volunteers, and also offering training and employment opportunities.

The garden provides an avenue for people from low-income communities to participate in climate action, something that has become

increasingly important. "We are so proud that the Blas na hÉireann Awards have shone such a positive spotlight on our wonderful community and the impact we are able to generate,"

said Peadar Lynch, who operates the Cherry Orchard Community Garden alongside a group of trained and enthusiastic volunteers.

President Mary McAleese

officially opened the Cherry Orchard Community Garden and Allotments back in 2010.

The goal of the garden was growing organic fruits and vegetables to reduce the carbon

footprint of imported alternatives and provide an amenity for locals to become more self-sufficient.

In the garden, the team grow fresh seasonal produce using traditional techniques to produce salad, kale, spinach, cherry tomatoes, herbs, flowers and a lot more.

In addition to its fruit and vegetable sales, the social enterprise lease allotments to local people to grow their own and it sells composted horse manure recycled from the neighbouring Cherry Orchard Equine Centre.

When people buy the locally grown vegetables, they are supporting a social enterprise which strives to be sustainable with low energy output, low food miles and a low carbon footprint.

All of the profits gained through the garden are reinvested into the project and locality, such is the nature of a social enterprise.

What is next? Well, the gardening crew are hoping to achieve full organic producer status through the Irish Organic Association sometime within the next year.

Gardai lauded as ‘heroes’ after rescue of woman from blaze

TWO gardai were commended for their bravery in saving a woman from a house fire last month.

Gardai Conor Treacy and Nigel Murphy, were the first responders at the scene of a house fire, and they used a ladder to access an upstairs window, lifting a woman in her 50s to safety.

The blaze engulfed a home in Buirg an Rí Walk in Clondalkin at around 1.30am, on September 8.

The bravery of the two gardai, who are attached to Lucan Garda Station, was acknowledged by Garda Commissioner Drew Harris this week, and by many members of the public, who praised them as “heroes” who “went above the call of duty.”

An Garda Síochána posted a picture of the gardai with Commissioner Harris, and some background details.

It was a regular night’s duty for Garda Conor Treacy and Garda Nigel Murphy when they were deployed to respond to fire at a home in

Lucan, in the early hours of Friday, September 8.

When they arrived at the address they were met by frantic nearby residents who were all gravely concerned that there was someone trapped inside the blaze.

A woman could be initially heard shouting for help but it wasn’t possible to gain entry via the front of the house.

She had then gone silent.

Garda Treacy and Garda Murphy kicked into action and plucked a ladder they had spotted in a neighbour’s garden – they managed to get in an upstairs bedroom window.

In the midst of heavy plumes of smoke, they found a woman in her 50s on the floor and together they lifted her to safety.

The woman received medical treatment and is now being looked after as she recuperates.

Both gardai were treated in hospital for smoke inhalation and returned to duty the following week.

Mushrooms, fungi and fairy rings



RINGS: Fairy rings in grass can grow metres wide

MUSHROOMS and fungi are plentiful in autumn, particularly after mild and damp weather.

Mushrooms are the fruiting cap of fungi. They produce the microscopic spores which float away to start a new colony elsewhere.

The fungus itself is a mass of tiny white root-like threads called a mycelium which lives underground in the soil or within rotting leaves and wood.

Sometimes we can see the effects of an underground soil fungus long before the visible mushroom appears.

These are the 'fairy rings' that are often seen in grassy lawns.

They look like large rings of dark, lush green grass that remain even when the grass is cut.

These rings represent the visible growth of an underground fungus.

When its spores first land in the grass and form a new colony, it grows outwards in a circle. As the fungus grows, it breaks down nutrients along its growing point at the edge of the ring. These nutrients

cause the grass at the edge of the ring to grow lush and tall. In autumn, mushrooms will appear along this growing edge.

A different type of a fairy ring occurs in woodlands where they appear as curving lines of mushrooms around the base of trees.

These mushrooms are the visible part of the complex mat of underground fungi that work in partnership with the trees.

Woodland trees need certain nutrients from the soil for their growth. The mat of underground fungus breaks down these nutrients and passes them directly to the roots of the trees.

In return, the trees pass sugars that they have made for themselves on to the fungus.

Because they look so unusual, fairy rings were once said to be places where the fairies danced and feasted at night.

It was said that if you stepped into a ring on the night of a full moon, the fairies would hold on to you and not let you go.

CAITRIONA Hogan retired from her role as principal of Scoil Maelruain Senior National School last week, having spent the majority of her teaching career in the Tallaght primary school.

Ms Hogan first walked through the doors of the school in 1985 when she commenced a teaching practice placement and remained at the school since then.

When she started working in the school, she was struck by the positive atmosphere and dedicated staff and knew it was the school for her.

"There was a fantastic atmosphere, great sports teams, the kids went on trips to places like Croke Park, and there was brilliant staff," Ms Hogan told *The Echo*.

"It was unique. It was a very big school, it was well-run and the kids were fabulous."

Over the years, Ms Hogan has witnessed changes in the education system that have cultivated a more inclusive learning environment.

"The biggest changes were the reduction in class sizes, and the introduction of SNAs," she said.

"When I started, there were no SNAs in the school to help the children who needed it, but now we have seven SNAs."

There were also challenges during Ms Hogan's tenure, with the implementation of Covid rules being particularly difficult.

"My worst day was when the government said children had to wear masks," she recalled.

"It was so hard, especially for children

with special needs. The children would be going around in masks, so you couldn't see their smiles and we couldn't get the school together for events."

A pressing challenge that Ms Hogan has witnessed is the ongoing teacher shortage in Dublin, as she said the school advertised for a teaching role for this academic year and received no applications.

"Now, as I leave, staffing is a huge challenge," she explained. "There is a vacancy in our school, but no one has applied. We've never had that before – but it's happening in nearly every school in Dublin."

However, Ms Hogan takes great joy from the years she spent in Scoil Maelruain SNS and the impact she has had.

When asked what her proudest moment has been, she said: "A past pupil came back to the school last week and met me at the gate."

"He said I taught him to read and write when he was ten or 11, and that he wasn't able to do it before."

The current school community gave Ms Hogan a strong send-off last week, which included a school concert where the pupils sang one of her favourite songs, Van Morrison's 'Days Like This'. See photos page 52

The importance of keeping the body healthy with exercise



EXPLORING: Students from St Mark's Community School

TEENAGERS from local secondary schools recently attended talks led by Trinity College and got to explore the importance of exercise and health within the community, reports Aideen O'Flaherty.

The transition year pupils who took part were from Old Bawn Community School, St Mark's Community School, Firhouse Community College, Coláiste de hÍde, and Mount Seskin Community College.

The event took place in the Trinity College School of Medicine's Discipline of Public Health and Primary Care in Tallaght Cross.

Researchers from Trinity delivered short, 15-minute talks to the students, and afterwards the school groups rotated through six interactive stations.

While at the stations, they engaged with the researchers, and learned more details about the impact of the research on their communities and on the healthcare system as a whole.

The ExWell research study challenged the students to test their grip-strength, do squats and press-ups and benchmark against what the research shows as the average for each age group.

Undergraduate students from the Human Health and Disease programme challenged students to guess the sugar content in some common foods.

Other interactive stations included under-desk cycling to reduce sedentary behaviour in adults, and there were discussion groups about some ongoing addiction research.

Last year's Trinity Access Programme (TAP) Bridge to College participants also did peer presentations of their school-based projects for the young people.

The event was run as part of the Academic Primary Care Collaborative whose ethos is 'Innovating Community Health' and was held to mark European Researchers' Night.

YOUTH Horizons is a unique Jobstown based education programme which has been a resource for the area's families since 1987.

Originally there were three founders, Dr Kate Ganter, who has now sadly passed on, Fr. Denis O'Connor, who moved to another parish some years ago, and the redoubtable Sr. Mairead Hughes who has been working with the youth of Jobstown for more years than she cares to remember.

And it is Sr. Mairead who is the focus of our Local Faces feature this week.

Originally from Clontarf, it's safe to say that education is in her DNA.

The daughter, and indeed, granddaughter of teachers, she went on to ply the family trade in various places before fortune smiled on her and she ended up in the bucolic splendour of West Dublin 24.

Sr Mairead's own education took her to secondary school at St Louis' in Rathmines, where she would eventually become a member of the Sisters of Saint Louis. As she tells me, "In those days it was very easy to cross the city. The school was great and it was worth the extra shoe leather getting there and back."

Leaving certificate acquired, Sr. Mairead then set her sights on a

Languages degree at UCD. Once that was achieved, she added an H.Dip in education and her varied career duly commenced.

"My first position was at a school in Kilkeel in County Down in 1969," she tells me. "I really enjoyed it and the people and the town were fantastic. I suppose things were complicated somewhat by the troubles which were really starting to become very serious during that time."

Apart from her regular duties, Sr. Mairead became the school's camogie coach, a role she loved and was very passionate about.

"I was definitely more of a coach than a player," she laughs. "It was much easier to tell the players what to do than show them!"

Having spent eight happy years in Kilkeel, Sr Mairead moved back south of the border in 1977 to accept a position at her alma mater, St Louis'.

Then in 1985, Sr. Mairead moved to Jobstown and things would never be the same again.

When Jobstown Community College was founded in 1986, our heroine was immediately installed as its first chaplain to go along with her teaching duties.

"I instantly loved it here," she says. "I knew I'd found a home in Jobstown and I wanted to do what I could to help

this developing area thrive."

After a very happy and gratifying time at Jobstown CC, Sr Mairead, along with her close friends, the aforementioned Dr Kate and Fr Denis began to speak seriously about the need for an extra facility which could help kids who face struggles in mainstream education.

Together, they took the initiative, and founded Youth Horizons.

The Youth Horizons vision is for a society in which everyone has the opportunity to complete their education to the best of their ability despite any challenges they face in mainstream education and in their home lives along the way.

Youth Horizons has achieved some great successes in recent years but its beginnings were humble to say the least.

Sr Mairead takes up the story; "When Sundale estate was being built, the first two houses were showhouses and had been, for the want of a better word, trashed. Between the three of us and many volunteers in the local community, we raised the funds to put in an offer on them. Eventually we were successful in acquiring and renovating both houses and they have been our home ever since."

"The services we provide have certainly evolved over the years," Sr

Mairead tells me.

"Initially, our aim was to respond to the needs of young people in the Jobstown area. For the first decade, we offered community building initiatives focusing on personal development courses, homework clubs, peer tutoring, chess and musical education.

Since 2000 we have responded to an expressed community need to provide support to early school leavers who found mainstream school challenging yet wanted to complete the Leaving Certificate."

She continues; "All young people need a safe space to achieve their full potential. Some children however, face challenges that prevent them from blossoming in mainstream education, be they socio-economic or otherwise, and we aim to provide them with the helping hand they need."

Services provided by Youth Horizons a Leaving Cert completion programme, along with a crèche for those students who may need childcare facilities.

It also offers a wide range of enrichment programmes including counselling, mentoring, career guidance, cooking & nutrition, life skills, wellbeing, work experience, cultural awareness, travel opportunities and transition to university.

For my research, Sr. Mairead was

kind enough to provide some beautifully written testimonials from former students, among them Matthew Phelan, Lorna O'Neill and high praise from Marian Fennell of Mount Seskin CC, a close collaborator with Youth Horizons.

Matthew is now flying in his chosen discipline of Electrical Engineering, and is now living and working in England having graduated from IT Tallaght.

Lorna is now a Teacher at the Secondary school that she left when she was sixteen!

Naturally, Sr. Mairead is keen to get the spotlight off herself and thank the people around her who make Youth Horizons such a success. Particular praise is given to the Manager Geraldine Cullen, and all the teachers, not to mention the ETB which sponsors them.

To sum up, although she'll never realise it, Sr. Mairead is quite simply one of the great hidden assets that make our community a better place. An hour in conversation with her feels like five minutes, and we're truly lucky to have her.

Tallaght Village Tidy Towns on their first year credited with 'helping to transform the area' with Clondalkin

A NUMBER of local Tidy Towns groups got impressive scores in this year's SuperValu Tidy Towns Competition, including Tallaght Tidy Towns who were first-time entrants this year.

The results of the competition were published last Friday, with Tallaght Tidy Towns being credited as "helping to transform the area" and it being "difficult to believe that this is just your first year".

All of the groups that took part in the national competition received scores, with higher scores meaning they were higher up the league table, with winner Abbeyleigh in Laois receiving 376.

Tidy Towns groups in South County Dublin and Dublin South Central had a strong showing on the league table and garnered respectable scores for their hard work.

Lucan Tidy Towns received a score of 357, with Clondalkin following closely behind with a score of 337.

The adjudicators told Clondalkin Tidy Towns that their hard work was evident and noted that "many high quality projects" were visible.

Cllr Eoin Ó Broin said: "Clondalkin Tidy

“As always, the standard of competition was extremely high this year in all categories...

Towns continues to go from strength to strength.

"This year's results were announced on Friday 6th October, with the group achieving an overall score of 337 in this year's competition – an increase of 14 points on our 2022 score.

"From an unofficial league of 47 Tidy Towns groups in the Dublin area, Clondalkin now proudly stands in 12th place. It is great to receive such recognition of our hard work."

Rathcoole earned a score of 264, Woodstown Village in Knocklyon achieved a score of 298, Crumlin got a score of 262, followed by Ballyboden with a score of 260.

Rathfarnham Tidy Towns's efforts were recognised with a score of 240, with Drimnagh, and Tymon North in Tallaght, both getting a score of 237 each.

Saggart Tidy Towns got a score of 233, which was welcomed by Lynn Tierney from the group who told *The Echo* about the work that had been undertaken by the volunteers.

"We are delighted to have the hard work of all committee members and volunteers recognised with increasing award scores for three consecutive years now," said Ms Tierney.

"We organise a range of projects and activities. Our monthly village clean-ups take place on a Saturday morning, where new volunteers of all ages and abilities are always welcome to join.

"Other projects include the upkeep of the flowers and plants in planters throughout the

village, running the Global Goals Book Club in local schools, water quality testing, trap neuter release programs for stray cats and liaising with South Dublin County Council for maintenance and funding of new initiatives.

"We are very proud of all we have achieved and are thankful to the committee and volunteers who put in the work, along with the support of South Dublin County Council, local businesses, and local community groups."

Tallaght Tidy Towns received a score of 217 with the adjudicators encouraging them to "keep up the good work" and compete again next year.

Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD, announced the winners at the awards ceremony last week and praised the competitors for cleaning their communities.

"As always, the standard of competition was extremely high this year in all categories, with 887 entries received overall," said Minister Humphreys.

"I want to pay tribute to all the winners today across all the various categories.

"In particular, I want to recognise the vital role of Tidy Towns volunteers across the country who are working so hard all year round to ensure our communities are vibrant, sustainable places to live, work and visit.

Man tried to put faeces soiled hand in female garda's face

39-year-old violently assaulted two gardai at the Mater Hospital has been sentenced

A MAN who violently assaulted two gardaí at the Mater Hospital in Dublin has been sentenced to three years in prison, with the final six months suspended.

John Paul Duncan (39) of Drumcain Avenue, Tallaght, Dublin 24 pleaded guilty to possessing €8,500 of cocaine contained in six condoms at Store Street Garda Station on January 31 last.

Duncan also admitted assaulting two gardaí who took him to the Mater hospital on the same day, after he became unwell upon swallowing cocaine.

Passing sentence on Wednesday at Dublin Circuit Criminal Court, Judge Orla Crowe refused to suspend Duncan's sentence in order to allow him attend residential drug treatment.

Keith Spencer BL, defending Duncan, had requested a fully-suspended sentence so that his client could take up a place in a rehabilitation centre from next week.

Judge Crowe set a headline sentence of four years for possessing cocaine, but reduced this in light of Duncan's early plea, his remorse and his efforts at rehabilitation.

Duncan's assaults on gardaí, described by Judge Crowe as "nasty", were taken into account.

Garda Clodagh Doyle told a previous hearing that gardaí were called to Lott's Café Bar on Liffey Street Lower after a man was seen wrapping up white powder underneath a table.

Duncan was arrested and brought to Store Street Garda Station, where he produced six condoms from his trousers, filled with over 122 grams of cocaine.

The cocaine had a total street value of just over €8,500, the court heard.

A few hours later, Duncan complained of being unwell and said he had swallowed cocaine earlier.

Garda Doyle and two colleagues accompanied Duncan to the Mater Hospital at around 7pm, where he became distressed and threw himself to the floor, retching.

Duncan said he needed the toilet and was

brought to a private room containing a commode.

Gardaí waiting outside heard him roaring and moving furniture around, and when they entered, Duncan took his hand, which had been inserted in his behind, and tried to put it in a female garda's face.

Gda Doyle told Olan Callanan BL, prosecuting, that Duncan then became extremely aggressive, leapt up from a chair and headbutted her colleague.

The three gardaí sought to restrain Duncan, and he went to bite one of their legs, then bit Gda Doyle's hands so hard that he penetrated two pairs of gloves.

Medical staff sedated Duncan, but he continued his aggressive behaviour and tried to flee until he fell asleep, continuing again when he awoke.

Duncan has 139 previous convictions in Ireland and 11 in other jurisdictions, including drug offences, assault causing harm, theft and escape from lawful custody.

He was sentenced to eight years in prison for his role in a €1.8 million cocaine haul in 2007.

Duncan escaped from Loughan House open prison in 2016 and fled to the UK, from where he was extradited in June 2017.

Mr Spencer BL, defending, said Duncan has a well-documented and long-standing drug addiction from the age of 15, progressing from cannabis to benzos, to cocaine and then to smoking crack.

Mr Spencer said his client's entire life has been blighted by drugs, and his attempts to set up a construction company fell asunder.

Duncan took the stand and agreed that his drug

use began when he suffered domestic violence as a child and turned to drugs to "block everything out".

He told the court he has been drug-free for a couple of months and is now motivated to get clean for his fiancée, his five-year-old son and everybody.

"I've never been clean since I was 15. You're talking 20 years," he said.

"My client is doing very well in custody and has an opportunity now to address his addiction. He's willing to throw himself into any course that the court orders," said Mr Spencer.

Judge Crowe suspended the final six months of the sentence for 18 months, and ordered Duncan to be of good behaviour for 18 months on release and abide by the supervision of the Probation Services.

'We're talking about the history of Tallaght, will there be a statue of Charlie O'Connor?'

PLANS for the development of a heritage centre in Tallaght are gathering pace after councillors approved the public consultation stage of the proposal at a council meeting on Monday, reports Aideen O'Flaherty.

The proposed centre will be adjacent to the Civic Theatre and will feature artefacts and interpretive exhibitions exploring the history of Tallaght.

In the discussion before the approval of the Part 8 public consultation process, local councillors shared their enthusiasm for the development of the centre.

Cllr Mick Duff (Ind) said: "It's an auspicious moment for us to get this, specifically knowing that the Tallaght councillors are fully behind this."

"My colleagues Cllr Charlie O'Connor (FF) and Cllr Teresa Costello (FF) led this charge on this, they put their weight behind this, and I think it's just an amazing thing for us to have in Tallaght."

"There's such a wonderful store of history that's out there, from across the county, that is now being brought in in real-life terms or digitally."

"It's something that we're really looking forward to, and I'm delighted that it's here before us to vote on today."

Cllr Cathal King (SF) also voiced his support for the centre and said that he is confident that it will be "hugely utilised" by people "from near and far".

Cllr Costello, who alongside Cllr O'Connor has been a strong proponent for a heritage centre in Tallaght, shared her excitement for the development.

"I'm very, very excited about this heritage centre," she enthused. "Have I ever mentioned I'm fifth generation Tallaght and very proud of it?"

"I always think that, if you know the history of where you're from, you have more respect for where you live, and I think this is going to be such an amazing addition to our community."

"It's going to raise people's pride in where they live."

At the conclusion of the discussion, Cllr Brian Lawlor (FG) congratulated council management for bringing the project to this stage, and quipped: "We're talking about the history of Tallaght, will there be a statue of Charlie O'Connor?"

The councillors approved the Part 8, which will now allow the project to progress to the detailed design stage, with plans for construction to commence at the beginning of 2024.

Businesses are feeling confident about growth potential this year

Two in five businesses in Ireland are planning for international expansion in next 12 months

MORE than two-in-five businesses in Ireland are planning for international expansion in the next 12 months – up 10 per cent on the previous year – according to the Equinix 2023 Global Tech Trends Survey.

Research by the US data centre builder, who operate data centres at Citywest, Kilcarbery Park, Northwest Business Park, and Blanchardstown, suggests that enterprises in Ireland are being more bullish about expansion versus the average business worldwide.

Equinix's survey, which included 100 IT decision-makers in Ireland, explored IT leaders' perceptions and plans relating to expansion.

It found that 79 per cent of enterprises anticipate expansion at some level – either in Ireland, into a new market, or internationally – up from 74 per cent the previous year.

However, anticipated expansions face external threats such as issues relating to data sovereignty, which has come into focus due to recent geopolitical events. The majority of IT leaders in Ireland (84 per cent) said that the implementation of new, stricter laws would impact their plans.

Peter Lantry, Managing Director for Ireland, Equinix, said: "Our research shows that businesses in Ireland are feeling far more confident about their growth potential this year. With that, we are seeing a marked shift in how enterprises are viewing international expansion. It no longer needs to be a labour-intensive and costly move with boots on the ground. Digital infrastructure is enabling businesses to deploy virtually via hybrid multi-cloud, providing them with the flexibility to scale their operation up and down as needed, without the cost and commitment associated with establishing a physical presence."

Last year, Equinix joined the Gaia-X initiative, an international nonprofit bringing businesses, the scientific community and political representatives together, to confront the challenge of data sovereignty in today's world.

Data centre saved 13 tonnes of CO2e with recycling partnership

Rathcoole company Vyta Group returns €77,000 in revenues to Servecentric

RATHCOOLE company Vyta Group, has enabled Servecentric, a data centre and connectivity services provider, to save 13 tonnes of CO2e (carbon dioxide equivalent) with its secure IT recycling and refurbishment services.

The partnership enabled Vyta to return €77,000 in revenues to Servecentric.

Based in Greenogue Business Park, Vyta is an IT recycling company, that collects, refurbishes, and resells retired IT equipment.

The deal with Servecentric, a provider for businesses in the US, UK, India and Ireland, represents a growing focus on sustainability from the data centre industry.

In the last year, Vyta collected, processed and reused or recycled 2,222 devices for Servecentric as a part of its IT retirement service, including servers, network units, and mixed WEEE (Waste electric and electronic

equipment).

Vyta refurbished a total of 205 items for Servecentric and resold them through Vyta's extensive network of sales channels, therefore enabling Vyta to return revenues to Servecentric. The CO2e savings enabled through the refurbishment of Servecentric's retired IT equipment represent the annual carbon dioxide absorption equivalent of 619 mature trees.

By recycling the remainder of the equipment, Vyta has helped Servecentric to keep all of these items out of landfill.

Faye Thomas, CCO, Vyta, said: "Through this partnership, Servecentric has helped to reduce the CO2 emissions involved in the destruction of old IT equipment and the manufacturing of new replacements, while also yielding substantial financial returns through the resale of the refurbished equipment. We are delighted to collaborate with such a forward-thinking business and look forward to our continued partnership in supporting the circular economy."

Dalata Group looks to expand its operations in Edinburgh

DALATA Hotel Group, which operates all the Maldron and Clayton brands in Ireland, has acquired a development site in Edinburgh as it looks to expand its presence in Scotland.

The site, which is located at St Andrew's Square in the Scottish capital, was acquired for €14.4m from Aviva Life & Pensions UK Limited.

Dalata plans to submit a revised planning application at the beginning of next year for the construction of a new 4-star Clayton Hotel at the site, which includes proposals for 153 bedrooms, a bar, restaurant, dry gym and two meeting rooms overlooking St Andrew's Square.

The group anticipates that this hotel would be ready to welcome guests by mid-2026. It will be Dalata's third hotel in Scotland.

Dalata estimates that the investment into the Clayton Hotel in Edinburgh will be around £48m, including the purchase of the site. It expects to create 60 jobs after opening.

"Edinburgh has long been a target city for us to locate our brands and we are delighted to have secured such a prestigious building in the centre of the city," chief executive Dermot Crowley said.

Dalata also announced last month that it had acquired the leasehold interest in Hard Rock Hotel Amsterdam American for a total consideration of €29.5m.

"In the year to date, we have announced four new opportunities in three of the strongest city hotel markets in Europe – London, Amsterdam and Edinburgh," Mr Crowley said.

"We will continue to seek out further opportunities in our target markets."

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Cookstown buildings fire safety alterations approved

One of the sites includes the building for international protection applicants



RETENTION permission has been approved for fire safety alterations to a number of buildings in Cookstown Industrial Estate – including one which is used by international protection applicants.

The subject sites are building 1, Units 1a, 1b, 1c and buildings 81a and 81b on Cookstown Estate Road, and buildings 2 and 3 at Old Belgard Road in Cookstown Industrial Estate.

The buildings were formerly owned by Joseph Costello Absolute Limousines and were the subject of an unsuccessful planning application for the development of 1,104 build-to-rent apartments.

Most recently, 81 Cookstown Industrial Estate – a former office building – has been turned into asylum seeker accommodation for up to 200 international protection applicants.

They are accommodated across the building's three floors in 102 bedrooms or 'accommodation pods' containing two standard beds and storage furniture.

A total of 42 toilets and 16 showers are

located within the building and are available all day long with an on-site laundry facility, according to a statement from the Department of Integration in late 2022.

A planning application for retention permission for the building, and a number of other buildings in the industrial estate, was lodged by Onyx Ireland 2022 Propco 1 Ltd last August.

Retention permission was also granted for over cladding of a brick facade at ground floor level, blocking up of roller shutter doors and over cladding of same and new fire escape doors.

These alterations are at building 1, Units

1a, 1b, 1c, Cookstown Estate Road.

Retention permission was also secured for the removal of dormant fire escape stairs, over cladding of facade, and the blocking up of roller shutter doors and over cladding of same and new fire escape doors.

These alterations are at buildings 81a and 81b on Cookstown Estate Road.

Permission was also being sought for the demolition of a car wash annex building and over cladding of facade at buildings 2 and 3 at Old Belgard Road.

Retention permission for the alterations was granted by South Dublin County Council on September 28.

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€495k guide price for retail unit and three-bedroom house on Crumlin Road

68-unit apartment block plans are lodged for Somerton Gate

PLANS for the development of a 68-unit apartment block at Somerton Gate in Lucan, have been submitted to South Dublin County Council.

If the proposal gets the green light, it will form an amendment to an existing permitted development which will see the number of apartment spaces in the overall scheme increase from 237 to 242.

The proposal by Quintain Developments Limited includes the development of 49 one-bed and 19 two-bed apartments in a single block

ranging in height from four to five storeys.

The reconfiguration of car parking along part of Somerton Gate and provision of a new road and car parking layout to the south and east of the block, forms part of the plans.

The reconfiguration will result in an increase of 12 car parking spaces, with the end result of 77 car

parking spaces in total.

Provision of a secure bicycle parking facility, totalling 93 spaces, to the east of the block and additional visitor bicycle parking, with 36 spaces, to the west of the block is included.

Permission is also being sought for the reconfiguration of a permitted bin store adjoining an existing apartment block, to provide a smaller bin store and new plant room.

A revised landscaping layout to the east of the new apartment block, and provision of plant at

ground floor and roof level including provision for PV panels is noted in the planning application.

The lands are bounded to the northwest by the Hillcrest residential development, to the northeast by SuperValu Lucan, to the south by permitted public open space and Somerton View.

The subject site is bounded to the north by a completed apartment block.

A decision on the planning application is due from South Dublin County Council by November 13.

Self-storage facility plans approved with conditions

THE planned construction of a self-storage facility to the east of Tay Lane in Greenogue, Rathcoole, has been given the go ahead by South Dublin County Council, reports Aideen O'Flaherty.

Applicant Sandymark Limited's proposal is for the construction of a self-storage building with ancillary facilities and associated development.

The self-storage building will have a maximum height of 9.745 metres with a Gross Floor Area of 1,796 sq.

m including a storage area (1,698 sq. m) and ancillary facilities (98 sq. m).

The development will also include a vehicular entrance/exit to the site via Tay Lane, six ancillary car parking spaces, including one accessible parking space, loading bays and external fire escape stairs.

Provision of an external canopy, boundary treatments, hard and soft landscaping, lighting, and all associated site and development works above and below ground are included.

On September 19, the council granted permission for the self-storage facility with a number of conditions.

These include entering into a wastewater connection agreement with Irish Water, and the submission of a Green Infrastructure Plan.

Sandymark Limited, led by founder and managing director Con McCarthy, is behind the development of Greenogue Business Park, Greenogue Logistics Park and the adjoining Aerodrome Business Park.

Single-use vapes with flavours to attract children are set to be banned by Govt.

Dear Editor

Ministers are reportedly poised to ban single-use vapes, after a series of calls from councils, leading paediatricians and public waste campaigners to make selling the disposable devices illegal on health and environmental grounds.

The move comes after the government concluded the products disproportionately target children, who then become addicted. The bright colours and fruity flavours of disposable vaping

devices are seen as attractive to children and teenagers.

Disposable vapes are the most frequently used vaping devices among young people. And paediatricians have sought a ban on disposable vapes and raising of legal age for buying tobacco and vapes to 21.

A prohibition on the use of flavours in vapes, with the exception of tobacco flavour, and stronger advertising and marketing restrictions have been called for by the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland's faculty of paediatrics.

The faculty said the use of vapes by children and young people poses serious health risks to them.

Prof Des Cox, a consultant in paediatric respiratory medicine says: "Exposure of children and adolescents to nicotine can lead to long-term negative impacts on brain development, as well as addiction. Aerosols in most vapes contain toxic substances, associated with increased risk of cardiovascular disease and lung disorders. Nicotine, which is highly addictive, is the major psychoactive component of vaping solution."

Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly wants to ban all single use e-cigarettes saying he will target flavours and point of sales in shops. He is planning a second piece of legislation to clamp down on vapes, curbing flavours and where they're advertised in shops.

Minister for the Circular Economy Ossian Smyth echoed calls for disposable vapes to be banned, saying they are "making the world a worse place".

One-day strike staged by criminal law barristers in row over pay restoration

Dear Editor,

THE on-going failure by the State to adequately remunerate barristers practising criminal law is unsettling.

Currently barristers are paid €1,144 fee per case they take ahead of its first hearing, notwithstanding the time a case may take to prepare.

Thereafter, the remuneration comes to €572 per day in daily 'refresher' fees. District Court defence barristers are paid €25.20 for a remand, €50.40 for a plea in

mitigation and €67 for a full trial hearing and the level of under-resourcing is replicated throughout the system.

The one-day strike on October 3 was backed by criminal defence barristers and solicitors who advocate in civil cases.

This led to the adjournment of all 22 cases listed in Dublin Circuit Criminal Court.

Among the cases adjourned was the trial of a Slovakian national, Józef Puska, of Lynally Grove, Mucklagh, Co Offaly, for the alleged murder of schoolteacher Ashling Murphy at Cappincur, Tullamore, on

January 12, 2022.

The pre-trial hearing of legal issues went ahead the next day.

Barristers participating in the CCJ strike were former High Court judge Barry White, who practices at the criminal Bar post retirement, as well as Labour Party leader and barrister Ivana Bacik, together with Labour's Justice spokesman, Aodhán Ó Ríordáin TD, and Senator Marie Sherlock.

Speaking in the Dáil, Taoiseach Leo Varadkar said barristers have "every right to protest".

"I can understand the case they're making, just like public servants and the vast majority of people across the public and private sector, they've seen their pay and fees restored, but that has to be done by negotiation."

The walkout is a first by criminal barristers and unique in that they are the only sector not to have pay restoration.

SPICED CARROT CAKE

Deliciously spiced carrot cake is one of my favourite cake recipes and one I am constantly requested to bake for family and colleagues at work. The recipe is for a loaf cake but sometimes I make it as cupcakes that way everybody gets an individual sweet treat or a round celebration cake – depending on the occasion I'm baking it for. I'm craving seasonal spiced desserts as we move into the midst of Autumn and this carrot cake, lightly kissed with spices and an indulgent orange flavoured cream cheese icing fits the bill perfectly. You will not be able to resist licking the bowl used to make the icing – it's incredible especially with the addition of grated orange zest. I promise this is one recipe you will come back to over and over again!

Ingredients: (serves 6-8)

200g self- raising flour
220g light brown sugar
400g grated carrots (I blitz them in a food processor)
3 large eggs
140ml vegetable oil
100g chopped walnuts
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon of bicarb
Pinch of sea salt

Icing:

300g cream cheese –(must be full fat)
300g icing sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Zest of 1 orange

John Paul Kennedy is a self-taught cook and an avid fan of collecting cookery books with a passion for good old-fashioned home cooking. His passion for proper family cooking stems from his grandmothers, who were both excellent cooks, one of whom was a trained chef. JP promises to bring us plenty of family-inspired recipes and tasty treats while showing us how to get the basics right.

Method:

1. Preheat your oven to 180 degrees and oil your loaf tin and line with baking parchment paper.
2. beat the eggs in a large mixing bowl then add the oil, brown sugar, grated carrots and walnuts.
3. sift in all the remaining dry ingredients and mix together well using a wooden spoon or food mixer if you have one.
4. Pour the cake batter into your prepared tin and place in the oven to bake for between an hour and an hour and 15 minutes - ovens do vary! Insert a metal skewer into the cake to check if it's baked. Once it comes out clean your cake is baked! If you are making as individual cupcakes (batter will make 14 -16 cupcakes) bake for 25 minutes. If making in a round cake tin, bake for 40 -45 minutes.
5. Allow to cool fully and prepare the icing. This icing is out of this world.
6. mix the icing sugar and cream cheese until well combined and there are no lumps. Then add the vanilla and grated orange zest and smear over your cake which is fully cooled by now. decorate with walnut halves, cut a slice and enjoy with a cup of tea or coffee. sheer heaven on a plate.

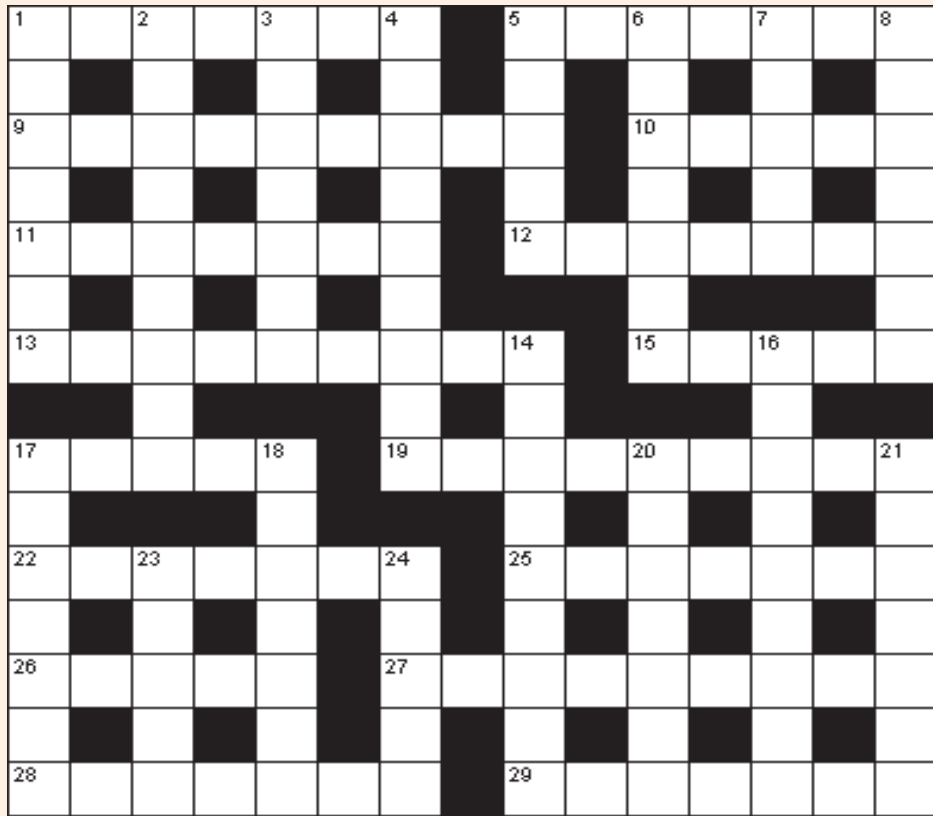


You can of course omit the walnuts if you're not a fan but I love the texture they give this cake. The cake is light, fluffy and deliciously spiced. It's quite a wet batter because of the oil instead of butter but don't worry it's meant to be. The cake will last up to a week in an airtight container in the fridge. If storing in the fridge take out about 15 minutes before you plan to eat it; to allow to come to room temperature. It's a really easy cake to make; merely a bit of measuring, little bit of prep and one I guarantee will fast become one of your favourite cakes to bake.

These are love (shringaara), laughter (haasya), kind-heartedness or compassion (karuna), anger (roudra), courage (veera), fear (bhayaanaka), disgust (bheebhatsya), wonder or surprise (adbhutha) and peace or tranquility (shaantha) and also the three Strains in Irish music: Goltraí "dirges or laments", from gol- ("weeping, crying") + -traí; The sorrow strain caused people to weep, Geantraí "joy music", from gean- ("smile, affection") + -traí, =; The joy strain incited merriment and Suantraí "lullaby", from suan- ("sleep, slumber") + -traí. The sleep strain lulls people to slumber.

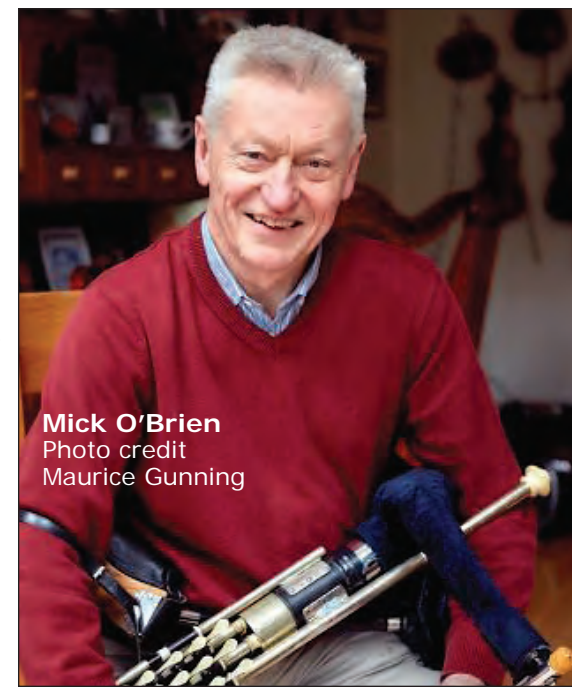





The 56-year-old milkman has been a member of the West Dublin Athletics Club for 23 years and regularly trains 170 young people. He also trains Kilnarnagh's athletes for the Community Games and is very

much involved in the Inter-Tallaght Community Games.

A very popular figure in Kilnarnagh, Tony says "I don't like the limelight but I am delighted for Kilnarnagh and for the kids". Tony said the award serves to highlight what they have achieved.

Environment Minister, Michael Smith presented the awards at a

gala ceremony at St. Marks G.A.A. Club, last Friday. He was deputising for Justice Minister, Marie-Geoghegan-Quinn who had taken ill. In a brief speech, Minister Smith said he was "honoured to be among people who had worked so hard to build a Tallaght which was not just a suburb, but a place with its own heart and its own

emphasis on development".

The assembled guests included M.E.P. Niall Andrews, local councillors, T.D.s and over 500 members of the community. During her opening address, Patricia Bryan, Chairperson of Tallaght Community Council said the I.D.A. needed to work harder to create new employment in the area. Patricia

also commented on the controversial Kiltipper rezoning, saying the people of Tallaght "want no more rezoning".

The Tallaght Community Council, who were also celebrating their 21st birthday, thanked the various sponsors, which included Gilbeys of Ireland and 747 Travel and wished the award winners every success.

Pushers Out-Cry

Community leaders in Killinarden have issued a stern warning to drug pushers - "get out and stay out".

The warning came at a specially convened meeting at Killinarden Community Hall last Tuesday, attended by over 500 people. Representatives of the Garda Siochana were also present.

A major drug user living in the area has now been given one week's notice to move out. The meeting heard allegations of drugs being freely obtained at her house - one youth claimed he was "banged up" there at least 25 times.

Three mothers spoke of how their sons became addicts, allegedly from the same source. Liam O'Brien, Chaplain at Killinarden Community School and P.R.O. for the Community Council said Killinarden is awash with drugs, including "napps" - an opium derivative. "There is a groundswell of anger

at the pushers and the authorities who allow the situation to continue unabated" he said. "We are now crying stop. We will no longer tolerate drug pushers in our community".

The Gardaí were also heavily criticised at the meeting, for what residents described as the "lack of law enforcement in relation to pushers." One woman told of a neighbour who informed the

guards that her own son was in possession of drugs. "Two weeks later, she is still waiting for them to call" she said.

Although Liam O'Brien acknowledges the difficulties facing the Guards, he said the community will have to take action to rid itself of "this evil". He insisted they are not vigilantes. "People have to protect their children" he said.

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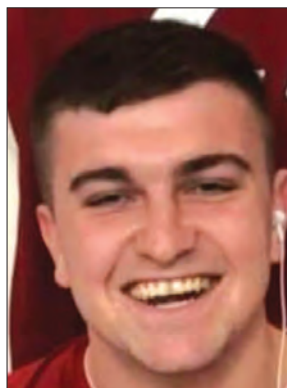

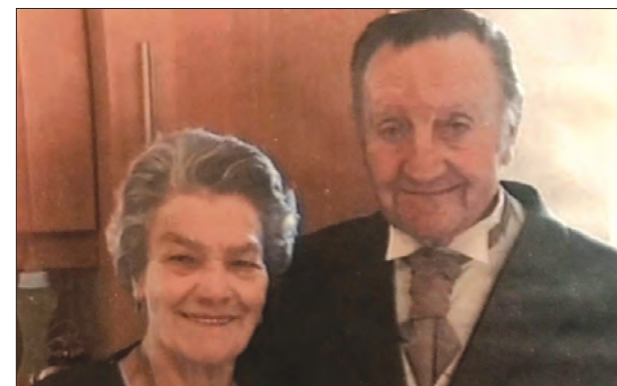

And the Saints go marching on into FAI Cup Final

ST PATRICK'S Athletic will go marching on into the FAI Cup Final after securing an emphatic 2-0 victory over Cork City in the penultimate round last Sunday reports *Hayden Moore*.

It will be an all-Dublin affair when the Saints clash with rivals Bohemians in the decider at the Aviva Stadium on November 12.

Dalymount Park, which has recently gone to Part 8 Public Consultation for redevelopment, will showcase a taster for what is to come in the cup showpiece when the two sides meet in the league.

Bohemian are set to host Jon Daly's men this Friday night at 7.45pm as the team's battle for a European qualification place in the SSE Airtricity League Premier Division.

Aside from when the sides last met in a nil-all draw in August, the Dublin Derby between the two is typically tantalising with a total of seven goals and three red cards in the two previous meetings.

When they collide in the cup decider next month, it will be a repeat of the dramatic 2021 final.

On that occasion, a scoreless opening 90 minutes brought the game into extra-time with Chris Forrester opening the scoring after 105-minutes.

On the restart, Rory Feely equalised for Bohs and it ended that way, with spot kicks needed to separate the teams.

Despite Forrester missing a penalty, the Gypsies' Tyreke Wilson and Keith Ward failed to convert, with Robbie Benson's spot kick taking the cup back to Inchicore.

Last season Derry City captured the cup and en route to this year's final, penalties saw St Pat's past the defending champions.

Also beating Longford Town and Finn Harps on the way, the Richmond Park outfit guaranteed a spot in the final after beating Cork City in the semi-final last Sunday.

An excellent Ryan McLaughlin delivery into the box was directed into the net by Mark Doyle after just 11-minutes and Conor Carty sealed the deal towards the end with a lovely slice inside the box.

Egan and Simmons become first Irish gold medalists at ICF Ocean Racing World Cup

JENNY Egan-Simmons and Jon Simmons left their first ever International Canoe Federation (ICF) Ocean Racing World Cup in Madeira, Portugal with gold medals in the mixed doubles, reports *Hayden Moore*.

Competing in a first international ocean race, Jenny Egan-Simmons and her husband Jon Simmons completed the grueling 29km race from Funchal to Calheta in Madeira in style last Saturday.

Lining out in the SS2 Mixed Double category on October 7, this was a new discipline for both the Salmon Leap athletes, and it required a slightly different skillset to sprint and marathon racing.

Lucan native Egan is a multiple World Cup medalist, World Championship medalist and European Championship medalist in both sprint and marathon.

Whereas Simmons, who is originally from the United Kingdom, is also a

Marathon World Cup medalist for Great Britain before making the move to Ireland.

Instead, the duo leaned on their endurance to get them across the course on the rough Atlantic Ocean waters for the Madeira challenge.

Conditions in the Atlantic Ocean proved to be particularly challenging, with a max elevation of 6m swells recorded and blistering strong winds howling across the sea during the race.

It was increasingly more difficult too with air temperatures topping out at 31 degrees and an energy sapping humidity to boot.

Despite all the conditions working against them, Egan-Simmons and Simmons worked tirelessly to cross the finish line in pole position.

This meant that the pair created a piece of history, becoming the first gold medalists for Ireland in an ICF Ocean Racing World Cup event.

Sexton to lead Ireland out against All-Blacks

IRELAND'S all-time record points scorer Jonathan Sexton has been named to start in a gigantic test against New Zealand in the 2023 Rugby World Cup quarter-final on Saturday.

Multiple records have fallen to the St Mary's College star since the tournament kicked-off in September, and he will captain Ireland into battle with All Blacks at the Stade de France in Paris.

In the group stages, Sexton became the oldest men's international player when Ireland battered Romania 82-8 in the opening round and he appears to be at his very best.

Further Irish World Cup records fell to Sexton in the opener, matching David Humphreys for the most points scored in a match with 24 (two tries and seven conversions) and becoming the all-time leading points scorer with 102.

Since then, across great battles with Tonga, South Africa and Scotland, Sexton has brought his points tally up to 129 in World Cup matches.

38-year-old Sexton captained the boys in green through the group stage with great cadence, acting like the conductor of the orchestra to top Pool A with four wins from four.

Mack Hansen and Clondalkin Rugby Club registered player James Lowe have also been given the nod to start against the All Blacks, after passing fitness tests earlier in the week.

Between their first meeting in 1905 and 2016, Ireland did not record a single win across 28 games against New Zealand.

However, after finally breaking the duck in 2016, Ireland have gone on to record five victories, ultimately toppling them at the summit of the world rankings.

A win against New Zealand on Saturday night will pit Andy Farrell's side up against the winners of Wales and Argentina in the semi-finals on October 20.

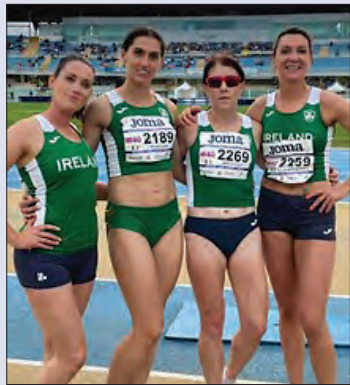

Liam began his racing career at the age of 8, when his Dad, Graham had to go through a lot of red tape to get a licence issued. No previous licence existed before Liam's older sister Gabrielle started racing in 2006, and went on to win the British Champion in 2010. Liam grew up on the race track from the age of 4 months old.

The father-son team had great times travelling Europe, sleeping in tents and carrying the winning race car on the roof of their family saloon car.

Drag racing is the second biggest motorsport in the US, and is fast taking hold as Europe's most exciting motorsport. Following the rise of F1 it is

bringing more eyes than ever to motor sport.

Liam's journey to winning European Championships has been self-funded, and he has come up against massive European competitors with sponsorship funding and expensive equipment and beaten them on the track.

On a shoestring budget, Liam and his Dad enjoy competing at the European championships where they pitch their tent alongside large motorhomes and trailers of their fellow competitors.

"Liam would arrive with the car on the roof racks to the amusement of the foreign racers who would point and stare and laugh at our setup. That soon changed when we took the car off the roof and bolted together and went out and qualified number one and won the event", says Dad Graham.
